PREMIER EXPECTS  
COAL FROM WEST

100,000 Tons From Alberta  
Will Be in Ontario by  
May 1.

Toronto, March 4.—Premier Ferguson spoke at some length this afternoon on Ontario getting coal from other Canadian provinces. Even if it meant a deficit for the national railways, there would be the satisfaction of knowing that the money was staying within Canada and that inter-provincial trade was being carried along as confederation intended that it should be.

He declared that arrangements had been made to bring 100,000 tons of Alberta coal to Ontario on May 1 next, and that in a short time it was hoped to get Alberta and Nova Scotia coal here as cheaply as United States coal was now brought in.

The premier announced that the reduction in interest on accounts in the Ontario savings banks was to provide a lower interest to farmers on their loans and also to provide a security fund against possible losses.

## BODY IS RECOVERED

Ridgeway, March 4.—The body of Herbert Green, age 28, a resident of Ridgeway, was located under 35 feet of water, a mile out from Crystal Beach in Lake Erie tonight. Green started out Tuesday morning with his dog team and sleigh for a day's fishing through the ice, while some of the most experienced fishermen considered the situation too risky.

The past ten days, to follow their regular winter's vocation. Into one of these treacherous places Green went down with his dogs and sleigh. 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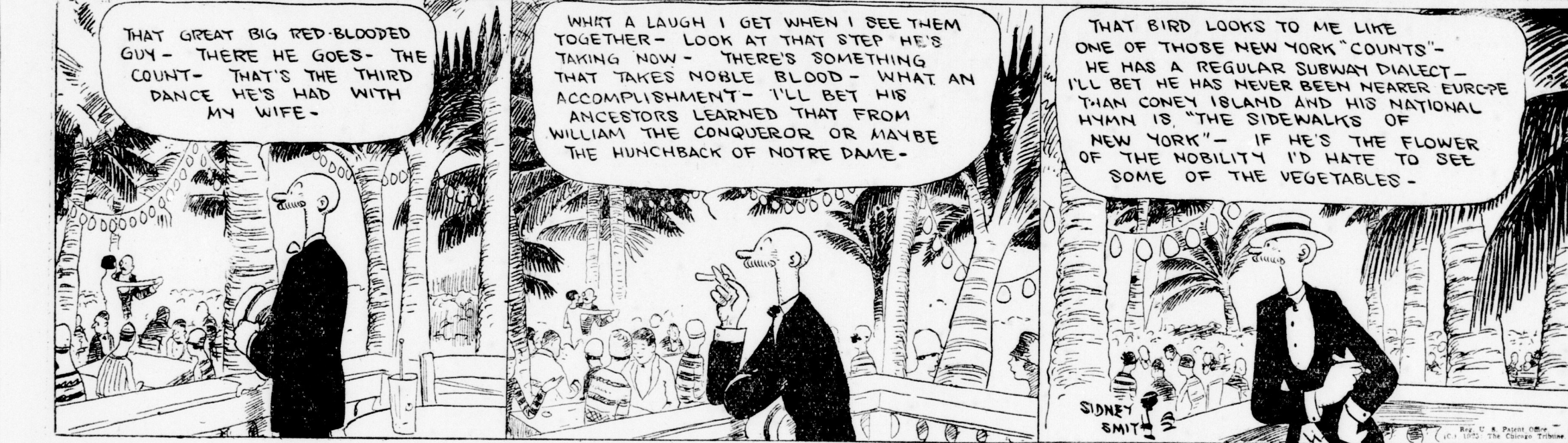

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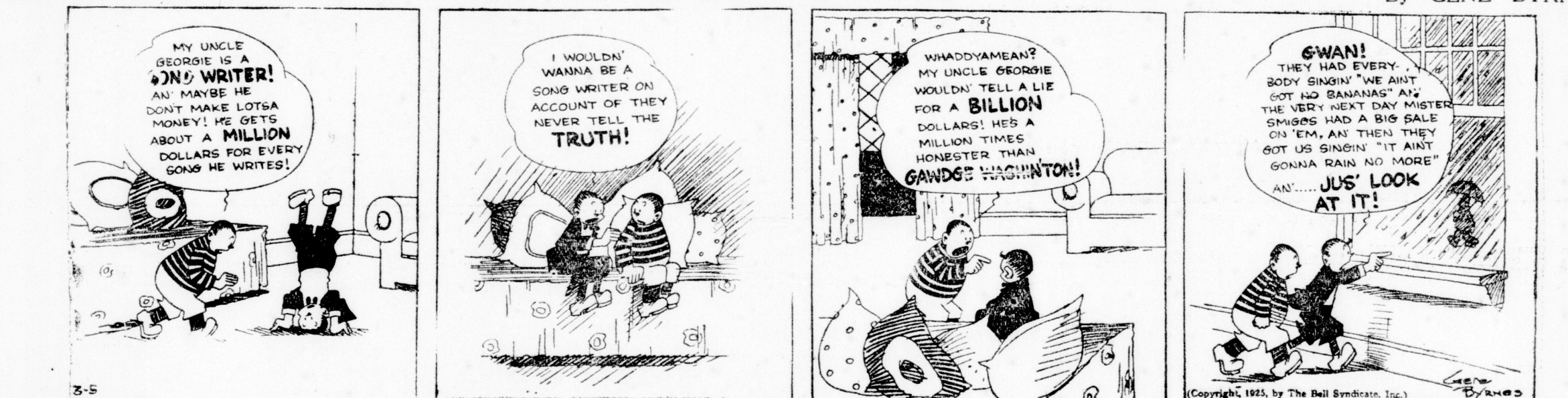
