C. P. R. DENIES REPORT OF NORTH BRANCH LINE

Company Has No Intentions of Building Line To Fort Churchill.

Canadian Press Despatch. Winnipeg, Nov. 4.—"The company has no intention of building a line to Fort Churchill, on the Hudson Bay," declared D. C. Coleman, vice-president of western lines, Canadian Pacific Railway here today when advised of a report that the C. P. R. planned the construction of a branch line through The Pas mineral belt. A local paper carried the report from its Ottawa correspondent and it said the "ultimate destination of the line would be Fort Churchill."

"There was," said Mr. Coleman, "a survey of a proposed Prince Albert to Herb Lake line but construction is not contemplated at the present time."

(Herb Lake is a mining district of Northern Manitoba, near The Pas.)

JEWISH COMMISSION APPEALS JUDGMENT

Quebec Court Rules Hebrew Children Should Attend Protestant Schools.

Ottawa, Nov. 4.—Argument was opened in the supreme court this morning on the appeal of certain Jewish members of a special commission appointed to investigate school matters in Montreal from a recent judgment of the Quebec court of appeal, which ruled that the legislation enacted by the Quebec legislature to the effect that, for school purposes Jews should be regarded as Protestants, was ultra vires of the Quebec legislature. The appeal is opposed by the Montreal Protestant board of school commissioners and the Catholic board of school commissioners. The court is asked to decide whether the act passed by the legislature of the province of Quebec in 1913 is ultra vires of its powers, and whether under this statute persons of Jewish religion can be appointed to the Protestant board of school commissioners of the city of Montreal, and if under the statute the Protestant board of school commissioners of the city of Montreal are obliged to appoint Jewish teachers in their schools, should the be attended by children professing Jewish religion.
