Many readers of the Free Press will
hear with pleasure of the action taken
at the recent meeting of the Women's
Missionary Society of the Methodist
Church in regard to Mrs. Large, a
lady who has hosts of friends in this
city and neighborhood. It will be re-
membered that she was recalled from
Japan with several others for some un-
explained reason by the General
Board, and at the late meeting an ex-
amination into the circumstances was
made, with the result that Mrs. Large
was clearly vindicated and her ad-
ministration of the affairs of the W.
M. S. in Japan such as to commend
itself to the judgment of the Board.
The utmost confidence was expressed
in her and the Mission Council in
Japan and its policy, and the Execu-
tive were empowered to reappoint
Mrs. Large to that country where, in
the judgment of the Executive, the
way to successful work is open.

It is stated already as the result of
a new regime coming into force on the
Grand Trunk Railway that much
stricter discipline has already been
enforced. It is somewhat over-gener-
ous system of issuing free passes
which in recent years was left to the
option of the several officers, will be
entirely controlled by the General
Manager's office. It is understood
that instructions have been received
from England to cut down the ex-
penses of the Mechanical Department,
and a much stricter supervision will be
kept over that department. It is ex-
pected that the new general manager
will take a run over the road before
Mr. Searegent's departure for Eng-
land, some time next month, but will
not take control of the road before
next January.

car loomed up unexpectedly and turned

out on the street, and under the car,
so that only three feet of space inter-
vened between her and probably cer-
tain death. Mrs. Wilson was able to
regain her buggy and drive home, but
yesterday felt a great deal of pain
arising from nervous shock and facial
injuries so that a doctor was called.

Bicyclers and drivers of rigs who
have been in the habit of frequenting
Victoria Park during the summer
months, now find the main entrances
barred, so that they cannot get
through, as usual. They complain
that the bar, being of thin iron piping,
is too small and laid too low across
the gateway, to be seen after night-
fall, and many bicycles are conse-
quently run against it, causing dan-
gerous falls. They think, and very
properly, that if the usual way is to be
barred to wheeled vehicles, the bar
should be so marked as to be easily
seen, for the safety of all comers.
