Sir Frederick Borden Finds Difficulty in Securing New Garrison.

Minister Explains Increase in Permanent Forces of the Dominion.

Five Thousand the Total of All Arms to Be Provided for.

OTTAWA, June 6.—To use a rather homely expression, the Minister of Militia has discovered that he has bitten off more than he can masticate. During this session he has been repeatedly told that it was a mistake to withdraw the British troops from Halifax and that good men would be difficult to find to take the place of the British regulars.

Explains the Scheme. Sir Frederick Borden explained the scheme of the increased permanent forces in the House today. The total forces in the House today are 4,800. The distribution of the forces will be as follows: Cavalry—Three squadrons Royal Canadian Dragoons and six squadrons Royal Canadian Mounted Rifles; 150 of the squadron, Total, 1,350.

Distribution of Forces. The detailed distribution of these forces would be as follows: One squadron of Dragoons at Toronto; one at St. John's, Que.; one at Fredericton; later two replacing the infantry, which would be moved to Montreal.

Royal Canadian Mounted Rifles—One squadron at Winnipeg, three in Alberta and one in British Columbia. The rest yet settled; squadrons to number 125 men.

Royal Canadian Garrison Artillery—Two batteries at Kingston, and half batteries at Winnipeg and Calgary. One Canadian Garrison Artillery—Two companies at Halifax, one company at Esquimaux and two companies at Quebec city.

The Auxiliary Corps. Army Service Medical and Ordnance Stores Corps are to be distributed among the different depots.
