O TTAWA, MARCH 28.—Hon. Mr. Emmerson introduced his bill to amend the railway act. The general amendments mostly relate to procedure. The principal alteration has reference to telephone companies and to some extent meets the views of municipalities. In ordering telephone connection with railway stations, the board in estimating compensation to be paid for such connection does not take into consideration any contract whereby a company gave exclusive privileges to any other company or person in respect a company gave exclusive privileges to any other company or person in respect to its stations. Another provision governs the regulation of telephone company may connect its system with that of another company subject to parliament, provided that the standard of its instruments is such that a connection could, in the opinion of the board, be satisfactorily obtained.
