The time for holding the examinations was left to the vice-chancelor and registrar, a general desire being expressed that the wishes of the members of the rifle company might be met if possible.

A memorandum was received from the board of management recommending certain changes in its constitution and requesting the opinion of the senate upon them. The chief feature of the proposed scheme is that the chancelor and vice-chancelor of the University and the president of the college should be ex-officio members of the board, and that of the other seven members five should be nominated by the senate and two by the college council, the five to be members of the senate or not as may seem best to that body, the other two not to be members of the council.
