

DANGERS TO WORKINGMEN

DISCUSSED BY THE TRADES AND LABOR COUNCIL

Election of Officers—Sympathy With the Suffrage Investigation by Government—Demanded—Other Business.

The regular and first meeting for January 1884, was held last evening, Mr. March, the president, in the chair. The credentials of Messrs. J. Aldridge, A. McCormick and W. Chalk, bricklayers; Messrs. Claxton and Outram, bakers, and S. Boden from the cigar makers were read and accepted.

After a ballot had been cast, the following were declared elected as officers for the ensuing six months, viz.: C. March, president; J. Booth, vice-president; J. Rose, secretary; S. Dunbar, finance secretary; I. Thomas, treasurer; J. Rodden, sergeant-at-arms; G. Harris, D. Murchie and J. Bedford, trustees; C. M. Harris, auditor.

Mr. O'Donoghue read the report of the legislative committee, which detailed as to the labor congress and its labors, recommended that the council do all in its power to give effect to the measure passed upon by the congress, and congratulated the council on the results likely to arise from its having called the congress together on this occasion. The report was adopted. Mr. Armstrong read the report of the organization committee on the subject of interchange of cards by laborers and other details of work done. Adopted.

Mr. O'Donoghue for the delegates to the labor congress gave a brief report of the business done thereat. A communication from the semi-centennial secretary asking that a deputation from that body be heard before the council was read. On motion it was decided to hear them at next meeting. The appointment of standing committee was deferred until next meeting.

On motion Mr. O'Donoghue the sum of \$2 per day was ordered to be paid respectively to S. Dunbar and W. Wilson who were engaged in the service of the congress.

On motion of Mr. Aldridge the constitution was amended so that in future no money can be voted for "strike" purposes unless at a summoned meeting and then by a two-thirds majority.

A resolution of condolence with the families of the victims of the railway collision was carried, and the secretary instructed to insert the same in the press. On motion the thanks of the council were tendered to Mr. James Lennox for granting the free use of a hall for the labor congress.

Moved by C. Shuch, seconded by J. Armstrong, that the legislative committee be empowered to memorialize the Ontario parliament as well as the Ontario legislature to appoint a commission to investigate the cause or causes of the very many railway accidents resulting in the sacrifice of so many valuable lives, the above commission to be empowered to suggest any measures to be adopted to prevent such accidents, and to report thereon as and when they may see fit.

UNIVERSITY OF TORONTO.

Proceedings at the Meeting of Senate last Night.

At the meeting of the University senate last night there were present: Vice-chancellor Mulock, Drs. Wilson and Richardson, and Messrs. Buchanan, Foster, Falconbridge, London, Houston and Wright.

A memorandum was received from the board of management recommending certain changes in its constitution and requesting the opinion of the senate upon them. The matter was held over for future consideration.

Mr. Houston gave notice of a motion to appoint a committee to draft a memorial to the Ontario government with a view to securing for female undergraduates of this university throughout the whole of the arts course tuition equal in quality to that provided in University college, and at no greater cost to students; and also of a motion declaring it expedient to make chemistry and biology optional subjects at junior matriculation in arts.

Mr. Mulock moved in the report of the committee appointed to consider the mode of dealing with the degree of L.L.D. Their recommendation is that the degree should be an honorary one, and that the legislature should be asked to amend the university act so as to enable the senate to grant it. Dr. Wilson gave notice of a motion that the senate should be authorized to pass a resolution providing for the admission of male as well as female candidates to the university final examinations was read a first time. The statute also provides that those candidates who pass in all the subjects of the first or second examination shall be regarded as having passed the corresponding matriculation examination.

The senate adjourned to the call of the chair.
