THE GATHERING AT ENNIS.

TEN THOUSAND PERSONS ATTEND THE LAZARUS MEETING.

The Police and soldiers put an end to the proceedings, the crowd quickly dispersed and the leaders broke their way to a boat.

DUBLIN, Sept. 4.—Ten thousand persons assembled today at Ennis to attend the meeting of the Irish National League. The police had taken possession of the Hill of Ballacorney, and it was intended to hold the meeting there.

At 3 o'clock the procession, estimated by two bands of music, including Messrs. Timony, Sullivan, Dillon, Cor, Sheehy, W. O'Brien and Phillip Stanhope, all members of the House of Commons, and several priests moved towards Ballacorney Hill, the approach to which was guarded by soldiers and police. The procession, finding its further progress barred, halted in a field, and Messrs. Sullivan, Stanhope and O'Brien made speeches from the top of the hill.

A troop of Hussars, headed by Col. Turner, divisional magistrate, rode up to where the procession had halted, and Col. Turner ordered the meeting to disperse within five minutes. Mr. Stanhope handed Col. Turner a copy of the resolution adopted by the meeting, calling Home Rule, declaring adherence to Mr. Parnell, and the Liberal party, pledging themselves to the proclamation of the League and denouncing the Government. Mr. Stanhope declared that the proceedings of the meeting were legal and that the proclamation of the League and the troops he would hold Col. Turner responsible.

Turner replied that he was bound to execute his orders. After a parley the procession returned to Ennis and O'Brien addressed the crowd. The soldiers and police again appearing, the procession passed on to a hotel, where the speaker, the crowd then dispersed quietly.

LONDON, Sept. 4.—The arrest of Henry Taylor, president of the Bank of London, yesterday morning caused, Mr. T. H. Purdon, of Messrs. Parke, Mills & Purdon, barristers, applied to Judge Davis to commit the captain on bail, his client was arrested at 4 p.m. Mr. Taylor, who had, in the meantime, failed to secure bail, was taken to prison and lodged in the debtor's cell. He took the matter coolly, but evidently minded when undergoing the customary search.

Mr. Taylor passed Sunday quietly in jail, a few friends and his counsel calling to see him. He is now known as No. 78. Mr. R. M. Meredith has been summoned to appear before the judge to-morrow morning in chambers to show cause why the captain Taylor's case should not be dismissed.
