New York's Anti-Bucket Shop Law,

ALBANY, June 11.—Governor Hill to-day signed the so-called Anti-Bucket Shop Bill. It provides substantially as follows: That any person or persons who shall keep a room to be used for making any wager or bets made to Samuel Heakes' Fungral.

used for making any wager or bets made to depend upon any lot, chance, casualty unknown or on the future price of stocks, bonds, secu-rities, commodities or property of any descrip-tion whatever, or for making any contract for or on account of any money, property or thing in action so bet or wagered, shall be guilty of a mindemeanor. The bill does not attempt to define what shall constitute a bet or wager but it leaves that a question wherever exating statutes and decisions of the courts have left or may leave it. Genuine business transactions will not be affected by the bill. Rooms may istill be continued to be need whont molestation for the carrying on of legitimate speculations. Valid commercial contracts, no matter how speculative, may still be made and enforced the same as ever.

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


