

M'CREA HOLDS UP INQUIRIES BILL

Questions Government's Right to Introduce Measure

QUIET IN LEGISLATURE

No Progress Made, Though Much Was Ready

TORONTO, March 31.—(Special to The Free Press).—Some day when the Hon. Ernest Drury is back upon the old homestead at Crown Hill, far from the stress and turmoil of public life, he is going to write a book on his experiences, and one of the prominent chapters in that important work will probably be labeled "How Not to Make Progress in the Legislature."

The premier has been gathering material all session and to-day's afternoon sitting furnished him with a number of valuable pointers. For once the usual before-the-orders-of-the-day-are-called-debate did not materialize and the House was down to business 19 minutes after Speaker Parliament had intoned the last "amen" of prayers. Three hours later when the House arose for recess the Government could not point to a single item of legislation advanced a stage.

DEBATE ON MINING ACT.

Hours was taken up in a discussion of the provisions of the Mining Act. Amendments, practically all of which the Government allowed to "stand" when faced with Opposition criticism. Then the premier set out to get second reading for the Government bill providing for the control of the waters of the English river and Upper Winnipeg river—and promptly agreed to let it stand when Peter Heenan, Labor member for Kenora, voiced an objection and wanted it laid over "for a few days or a few weeks." A "few years" would probably have suited him better, but he wanted to be moderate in his demand. Premier Drury said that the west end of the northern part of the province would be very badly off without some such legislation as he was proposing to put through the House. The member for Kenora said it was a matter of vital importance to the Town of Kenora and he thought that a deputation from there should be given an opportunity to wait upon the Government.


MUST STAND FIRM

"The rights of the province must be amply protected," said Hon. G. Howard Ferguson. "The Government must not concede anything which will invade the sovereignty of the rights of the province. The Government must be firm in dealing with the Dominion Government and the Government of Manitoba, so far as this province is concerned the paramount interest is power and we must not sacrifice that. The Government must see to it that the province and not any private interest or individual gets the preference." The premier said that the Dominion Government was willing to yield its powers to limit the level of the Lake of the Woods for navigation purposes within the limits set by international agreement to the Lake of the Woods control board. Co-operation was absolutely necessary, he said. The Manitoba Government had not made any representations regarding the matter, the premier added.

"Then you are in the position where you have to abandon your absolute sovereignty?" asked Hon. G. H. Ferguson.

"I suppose we are," admitted the premier. It was with something like desperation that the premier moved the second reading of the bill to amend the Public Inquiries Act to take care of situations similar to that which has arisen out of the Spanish River Pulp and Paper Mills, Limited, in applying for an injunction restraining the Riddell-Latchford commission from investigating certain matters in connection with the company's business. He made only a brief speech, emphasizing the importance of protecting Govern-
