The Dresden Times of last week says:—"On the evening of Monday, October 11th, Mrs. Bruce Marwick, assistant teacher of the Continuation School, unfortunately had a fainting spell, followed by a nervous breakdown. The attending physician ordered absolute quietness until the end of the week at least. The following week her condition had not even improved enough for her to rise from her bed for any length of time; but she decided that her pupils were losing valuable time. Consequently, she arranged the front of her home to accommodate any one "ferry" and actually taught lying on a davenport. While every one sincerely hopes that she will soon recover, Mrs. Marwick's condition has been serious, and the citizens of Dresden, especially the parents of the pupils and the pupils themselves, should be very grateful to her for this ambitious act, and Dresden should congratulate itself on having a teacher who takes so much interest in her students."

BOSANQUET COUNCIL

Council met on the 4th inst. Minutes of last meeting confirmed. The engineer's report for the repair of the Haney drain was read and considered, and laid over until next regular meeting for further consideration. Bylaws were passed to collect \$56 from the lands and roads assessed for the outlet of the Duffus drain, and \$264.04 overdraft on the Hilborn drain, to refund balances on the South Boundary and Mud Creek

drains and appointing Wm. Brander tax collector. The May drain bylaw was finally passed and Mr. Vivian and Mr. Russell appointed commissioners. A number of accounts were ordered to be paid. Council adjourned to meet on Monday, Nov. 1st, at 10 a.m., as a Court of Revision on the Gray drain and for general business. The Court of Revision on the Elliott-Moloy drain reduced Jas. Elliott's assessment \$70, John Elliott's \$25, Geo. Davidson's \$7 and Geo. Jamieson's \$5. Wm. Fleming's and Joe Moloy's were each raised \$37.00 and Wm. Rowcliffe was assessed \$27 and Wm. Rutherford \$5. With these changes the assessments were confirmed. The Grand Trunk Railway appeal to the Judge against their assessment will be heard on Nov. 9.
