COST OF CONQUEST.—It is said that the Boer War, up to March '02, cost Great Britain \$1,100,000,000, each Boer costing \$3,400, and the conquest of each soldier costing \$32,000. MISSIONARY FIGURES.—These figures are increasing continually, but at present there are, in round numbers, 558 foreign missions, with 18,000 mis-

sionaries; 1,500 church members, and 4,500,000 adherents, and \$20,000,000 expended for the work annually. Besides this, the leaven of Christian influence that utterly defies tabulation, is spreading widely and rapidly among earth's unchristianized millions, so that from the foundation-laying, the seed-sowing, and the achievements of Christian missions during the last century, we can only hope what the advances of Christianity this century may be.
