GENERAL INFORMATION.

Classes:

SCHOOL BOOKS—From 7 a.m. to 10 a.m. From 10 a.m. to 12 noon. DRAWING—From 7 p.m. on Tuesday and Thursday each week.
GIRLS' FANCY WORK CLASS—From 7 p.m. to 9 p.m. on Wednesday and Friday. PUPILS—From 7 to 8 for pupils.

Articulation Classes:

From 7 a.m. to 12 noon and from 7 p.m. to 9 p.m.

Religious Exercises.

EVERY SUNDAY—Primary pupils at 10 a.m. Senior pupils at 11 a.m. GATHERING 2:30 p.m., immediately after which Class will assemble.
EACH SCHOOL DAY the pupils are to be in the Chapel at 8:15 a.m., and the teacher in charge for the week, will open the service and afterwards dismiss them. They may reach their respective schools later than 9 o'clock. In the afternoon at 3 o'clock the pupils will again assemble after prayer will be dismissed in an orderly manner.

Clergymen of all Denominations are cordially invited to visit us at any time.

Industrial Departments:

PRINTING OFFICE, SHOPS AND CARPENTERS' SHOPS from 7:30 to 9:30 a.m., and from 2:30 to 5:30 p.m. for pupils who attend school. Those who do not attend school, from 7:30 to 9:30 a.m. and from 2:30 to 5:30 p.m. on each working day except Saturday, when the office and shops will be closed at noon.
THE SEWING CLASS Hours are from 12 o'clock, noon, and from 1:30 to 3:30 p.m. for those who do not attend school, and from 3:30 to 5:30 p.m. for those who do. No work on Saturday afternoons.

Visitors:

Persons who are interested, desiring to visit the Institution, will be made welcome on any school day. No visitors are allowed on Saturdays, holidays or holidays of the regular chapel exercises at 2:30 p.m. on ordinary school days is as usual, unless in the afternoon as possible, as the classes are dismissed at 3:00 o'clock.

Admission of Children:

When pupils are admitted and interviewed with them to the Institution, they are advised not to linger and prolong the taking of their children. It only causes discomfort for all concerned, particularly the parent. The child will be tenderly cared for, and if left in our charge, others will be quite happy with the others on the days, in some cases in a few hours.

Visitation:

It is not beneficial to the pupils for frequent visits. If parents or friends come, however, they will be made welcome to the class rooms and allowed every opportunity of seeing the general work of the school. We cannot furnish lodging, or entertain guests at the Institution. Accommodation may be had in the city at the Quinlan Hotel, Hoffman House, Queens Hotel, American and Dominion Hotels at moderate rates.

Clothing and Management:

Parents will be good enough to give all instructions concerning clothing and management of their children to the Superintendent. Correspondence will be allowed between parents and employees under any circumstances without special permission on each occasion.

Sickness and Correspondence:

In case of the serious illness of pupils letters or telegrams will be sent daily to parents or guardians. IN THE ABSENCE OF PARENTS OR FRIENDS OF PUPILS MAY BE QUITE SURE AND WELL.
All pupils who are capable of doing so are required to write home every three weeks. Letters will be written by the teachers for little ones who cannot write, stating, as far as possible, their wishes.
No medical preparations that have to be used at home, or prescribed by family physicians will be allowed to be taken by pupils except with the consent and direction of the Physician of the Institution.
Parents and friends of deaf children are warned against Quack Doctors who advertise cures and appliances for the cure of deafness. In 25 cases out of 100 they are feeble and only want money for which they give no return. Consult well known medical practitioners in cases of adventurous deafness and be guided by their counsel and advice.
