JESUS HEALS A MAN BORN BLIND

March 15, 1908

BETWEEN THE LESSONS About six months intervene between last Lesson and to-day's. chief events of this period are . Jesus' visit to the regions of Tyre and Sidon, where He healed the daughter of the Syrophenician woman (Matt. 15. 21-28; Mark 7. 24-30); the healing of many, and especially a deafmute in Decapolis (Mark 7 . 31-37), followed by the feeding of the Four Thousand (Matt. 15 : 32-39; Mark 8. 1-9), and the restoring of sight to a blind man at Bethsaida, Mark 8: 22-26. After this, Jesus went up to Jerusalem for the Feast of Tabernacles, held in October. During the feast, He taught in the temple, until the Jews, in their hatred, attempted to stone Him, John, chs. 7,8.

I. MISERY.-1-3. Jesus passed by; perhaps on His way from the temple, where He had been teaching, ch. 8: 59. He saw; with His quick eye

hopeless, therefore, in regard to restoration of sight. Disciples asked..who did sin? It was a common belief among the Jews, in which the disciples shared, that each particular sickness or sorrow was the result of a particular sin. Jesus corrects this wrong notion in Luke 13: 1-5. Neither..this man. It could not be that the man's own sin had

brought on his blindness. He was born blind-Nor his parents. Children do suffer for their parents' sins (Ex. 20: 5; Deut. 5: 9); but this man's blindness was not the fault of his parents, said Jesus. Works of God.. made manifest in him. Suffering, however caused, is an opportunity for the power and mercy of God to reveal themselves.

II. MERCY.-4, 5. We must work (Rev. Ver.). Jesus takes His disciples into partnership with Himself in the great work of saving the world. Works of him that sent me.
