at any advance on last week's quotations. We do not think there is much, if any, change in prices this week. The Maine Cattle were mostly workers, for which there is a moderate demand.

Stores—Yearlings \$15 to \$25 per head: two-year-olds, \$30 to \$45; three-year-olds, \$33 to \$65. Most of the small Cattle that are in good condition are sold for Bee. There is not so many small Cattle at market as there was last week.

Working Oxen—Prices range from \$165, \$172, \$180, \$200, \$215, \$236 to \$250 per [pair. There is a good supply at market, with a moderate demand.

Milch Cows—Soles of extra at \$55 to \$110; ordinary at \$60 to \$50; Store Cows at \$45 to \$55. The price of Milch Cows depends altogether on the fancy of the purchaser. There has not been many extra Cows at market for the past few weeks.

Sheep and Lambs—The supply is larger than last week, and the trade for good quality is talar, but poor lots cell very slows. The large supply mentioned includes those which came in Thursday and yesterday and yesterday. Sales of Lambs at \$2.25 to \$4 25 per head and Sheep at 35 to 65 per lb.

Swine—Store Pigs by wholesale at 7c per lb, and by retail at 7c to 8c per lb.

Fat Hogs—4, 160 at market; sales at 74c to 8fc per lb.
