This power of amendment, which existed already in some cases, will tend to prevent a failure of justice in criminal trials generally, arising from accidental errors or omissions in transcribing or setting out instruments neces-

They state that they have visited the principal munufacturing and some of the agricultural districts in England, Scotland, and Ireland; and that every where they found an unanimous approval of the proposed ex-hibition, with a general desire that it should be not only national but universal. The preponderent feeling, also, was in favour of supporting the exhibition by voluntary subscriptions, rather than by a grant from Parliament. In some few cases there was an unwillingness to exhibit, arising from fear of piracy. The great amount of opinion recognised the advantage of large money-prizes; though there was much variety of proposal upon this point. The reporters conclude with an assurance, in the name of the East India Company, that the Company's cordial aid will be given to the project, by obtaining objects for exhibition from India.
