

USEFUL READING.

FLEAS IN THE BARN.—When a barn is infested with fleas, there is some cause for it that might be removed. Poultry will sometimes stock a barn with such vermin when they are permitted to roost in it.

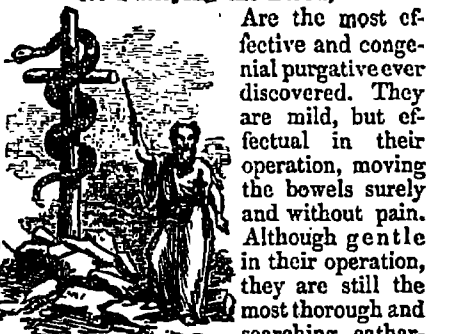

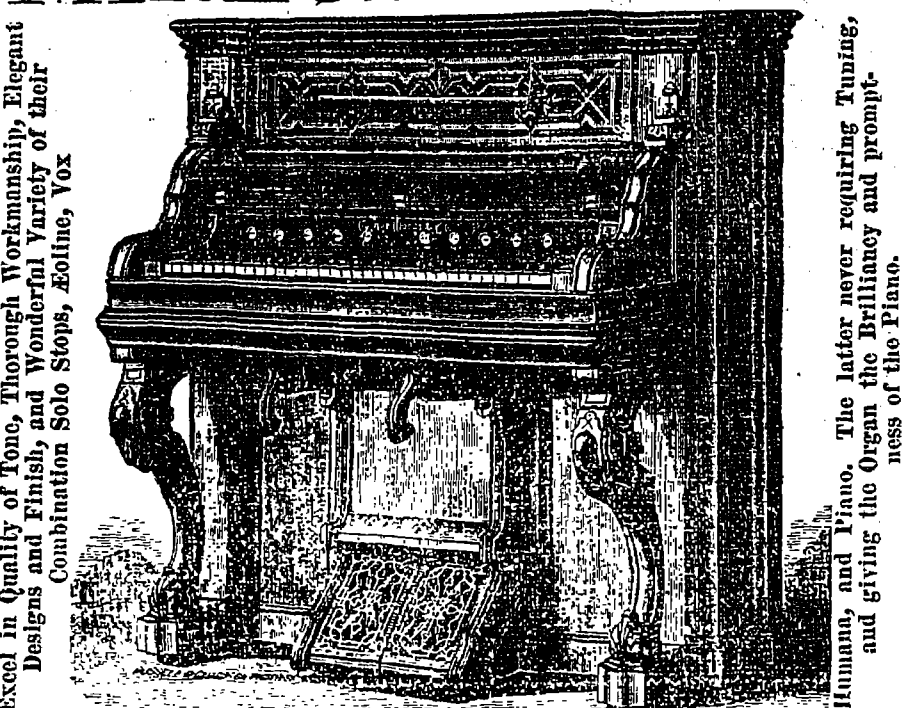
