

THOMAS CARTER

Mr. Carter was born in Toronto on June 10, 1915. He studied at Bishop's University and the University of London where he received a M.Sc.(Econ.) in 1939. During the war (in the course of which he was awarded the MC) he served in the Canadian Army and was discharged in 1945 at the rank of Captain.

Mr. Carter joined the Department of External Affairs in 1945. He served in several posts in Europe early in his career. Other appointments abroad have been as High Commissioner to Nigeria and Ambassador to the United Arab Republic. He served in various divisions at departmental headquarters before becoming Director-General, Bureau of African and Middle Eastern Affairs in 1971.

Mr. Carter is married and has one daughter.

ROGER DUHAMEL

Mr. Duhamel was born in Hamilton on April 16, 1916. He studied at the University of Montreal where he received his LL.L. in 1938. For several years he was a journalist and editor with Le Devoir, Montreal-Matin, and La Patrie, before entering the public service in 1958 as vice-president of the Board of Broadcasting Governors.

Mr. Duhamel was named Queen's Printer in 1960, a position he held until entering the Department of External Affairs in 1969. Since 1971, he has acted as special advisor to the Secretary of State.

Mr. Duhamel is married and has four children.
