CBC FACILITY IN REGINA

Question No. 794—**Mr. de Jong:**

1. What is the status of the planned CBC facility in Regina at this time?
2. Will the facility be built and, if so, what is the timing on the project?

Mr. Peter Stollery (Parliamentary Secretary to Secretary of State and Minister of Communications): I am informed by the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation as follows:

1. The CBC's Regina consolidation project on the planed Wascana site will proceed after the revision of operations requirements, updating of cost estimates and of the schedule.
2. Yes. Tender calls are expected around October of this year. The operational target date is set for approximately early 1984.

NUTRITIONAL SCHOOL LUNCH PROGRAM

Question No. 797—**Mr. de Jong:**

Were studies undertaken by the Department of National Health and Welfare to study the possibility of introducing a nutritional school lunch program across Canada and, if so, will the studies be made public?

Hon. Monique Bégin (Minister of National Health and Welfare): There have been no specific studies by the Department of National Health and Welfare on the possibility of introducing nutritional school lunch programs across the country. There has, however, been collaborative action with the provinces on this issue. In 1974, a review of existing school lunch programs was undertaken through the federal-provincial subcommittee on nutrition. As a result of the review, a set of "Guidelines for School Food Programs in Canada" was produced in 1976 which was designed to support the efforts of local communities to improve school food services. The guidelines have been distributed to many groups. At the same time provincial departments of health, local school boards, and health units have taken initiatives to provide nutritious foods in conjunction with nutrition education programs.
