I have not heard any of them stand up and flatly say: "We in the Liberal Party at all levels, federally and provincially, repudiate the introduction of user fees."

That is what is sticking in their craw, they cannot say that because there are several prominent Liberals in this country who are repeatedly advocating that as a solution to medicare.

We have not denied that there are problems, that there have to be changes and innovations. We certainly have not denied that the financial squeeze that the Liberals and now the Tories have put on the health care system is creating problems. But we have said clearly: "One solution is we will not abandon our principles".
