

(1) That we allow the building to be erected on our property.

(2) That the I.O.D.E. organization would administer the building.

(3) That McGill could have the use of it whenever desired.

(4) At the end of a period of years, say 25, the building would become the property of the University.

There was a good deal of discussion about the project, at the end of which it was agreed that the University would prepare a memo setting forth the conditions under which it would be prepared to join the I.O.D.E. in the project, if such a union were possible .
