WANT NEW POST-OFFICE OVER IN WEST YORK

G.T.R. Busy Ballasting Belt Line—Board of Health Hold First Meeting—Suburbs.

There was a good attendance of neighbors at the residence of David Gooderham, on the Vaughan plank road, about three and three-quarter miles north of Fairbank, last night, when the question of establishing a new postoffice in that section was under discussion, the proposition being enthusiastically endorsed by everyone present. The district name is fairly two and one-half miles from the nearest office, and in the very heart of one of the most agricultural districts in Ontario. W. F. Maclean, M.P., was present and promised his hearty assistance in presentation of the matter before the postmaster-general. A petition submitted last night was signed by everyone present, and this will be largely supplemented when circulated among neighboring farmers.

Mr. Maclean advocated the extension of the free rural mail delivery system, and a proposition outlining a route, strating at Fairbank, continuing up the Vaughan plank road to the line between York West and Vaughan Township, thence west to Cherry, down to Ella and Downsview, was mapped out. It is a singular thing that while this free rural mail delivery in East York the same service does not obtain in West York. From the unanimity and enthusiasm manifested last night, the condition will undoubtedly be soon remedied.

NORTH TORONTO.

Old Belt Line Will Soon Be Centre of Business Activity.

NORTH TORONTO, Sept. 15.—(Special.)—The southern end of the town experienced something of a thrill yesterday when for the first time in 12 years the right of a Grand Trunk engine and train steaming along the old Belt Line Railway was seen. The construction train, containing about a dozen cars, was ballasting the same right up to Yonge-street bridge, the present eastern terminus of the road, and the work of placing the roadbed in the vicinity of the old station buildings a few hundred yards east of Yonge-street, will be prosecuted with all vigor. It is said that the line will be at once extended to the old station buildings a few hundred yards east of Yonge-street, and the company has no intention at the present time of going beyond the points indicated. The saving to the merchants and citizens generally in avoiding the big hill to the north of the C.P.R. tracks in the cartage of freight will be enormous. The road will be open for business in about a fortnight.
