
Venerable Rector of St. George's Succumbs to Effects of Ptomaine Poisoning

Canon John D'Arcy Cayley, whose death occurred somewhat unexpected!y in Muskoka on Sunday evening after. ck of ptomaine poisoning, was one of the prominent Anglican clergymen of the city. As rector of St. TORONTO and HAMILTON George's since 1874, he has been both popular and highly respected.

Canon Cayley had to undergo a severe operation about two years ago and since then, while discharging his duties, he has not been robust. Mrs. Cayley died several years ago, and the deceased is survived by one son. Rev. E. C. Cayley, Rural Dean of To-ronto, and rector of St. Simon's Church; and three daughters, Miss Mary A. He received his early education under Dr. Palmer of Guelph, and later attended Upper Canada College and graduated from Trinity College. He was ordained to the deaconate by Bishop Strachan in 1860, and the Bishop of Chichester priested him in the following year. Mr. Cayley remained in England from 1860 Cayley remained in England from 1860 to 1863, during whitch time he had curacies at Cowfold and afterwards at Firle, in the Diocese of Chichester. In June, 1861, he married Mary M., daughter of John S. Cartwright. Returning to Canada in 1863, Mr. Cayley became rector of All Saints, Whitby, and remained there until 1874, when he came mained there until 1874, when he came to Torq to to become rector of St. George's Church, which at that time stood in 1 prosperous up-town district. He retained the rectorship until his death, tho the parish saw many year ago it amalgamated with St. Margaret's parish and Rev. R. J. Moore co-operated with him in the joint charge, but failing health made it difficult for Canon Cayley to keep up his active work. He was canon and precentor at St. Alban's Cathedral, and helped to intone the service there at the last ordination sermon on Whit-sunday. He took an active interest in the Church Book Room and in Bishop Blyth's work among the Jews in Jerus-
