EDUCATIONAL BOARD INCREASES SALARIES

Several Officials Get More—
Thirteen Nurses Graduate—
Finance Committee Meets.

HAMILTON, Sept. 5.—(Special.)—Assessment Commissioner Atkinson has landed another big industry for the city. The new concern is to be a branch of the E. C. Atkins & Co. saw manufacturing industry of Indianapolis, Ind., which is capitalized at a million and a half. The company has bought the site of the old Hoopner Refining Co., on North Sherman-avenue, and it will spend about \$150,000 on the new plant.

SALARIES RAISED.

The international committee of the board of education raised the salaries of several more employees of the board to-night, as follows: Principal Thompson of the collegiate institute, from \$2,500 to \$3,000 a year; Inspector Ballard from \$2,200 to \$2,500; Secretary Foster, \$1,200 to \$1,300; junior male masters in the collegiate institute, from \$1,800 to \$1,900. Dr. Roberts, who was recently deprived of \$200 salary from the board for examining the school children, on the way to the work in the future, and his offer was accepted. It was decided to ask Inspector Ballard and Principal Thompson to report on the efficiency of the teachers and teachers in the public schools and collegiate institute. CHILDREN'S DAY SERVICES.

Presbyterians to Devote Sept. 29 to Interests of Juveniles.

The Presbyterian general assembly committee on Sabbath schools met yesterday in the Confederation Life Building. A pamphlet entitled, "Suggestions for a Sabbath School Library of 200 Volumes" was placed in the hands of the committee and recommended for use among new sections.

The children's day service of the Presbyterian Church has been fixed for the Sabbath of Sept. 23.

The teachers' training department stated that they had a new text book entitled, "Book of New Testament," now ready for any classes beginning work this month. Various grants were made for Sabbath school work from various synods as follows: Maritime Provinces, \$500; Montreal and Ottawa \$500; Toronto and Kingston \$500; Hamilton and London \$500; Manitoba \$400; Saskatchewan \$500; Alberta \$500; British Columbia \$300.

An important motion was passed, which reads: "That the senate of the various colleges of the church be requested to grant the several secretaries for Sabbath schools an opportunity during the coming session to place the Sabbath school work of the church before the students."

The treasurer's report stated the receipts of the year to be \$10,052.62.

LETTER CARRIERS' GRIEVANCES

Dominion Association Meeting in Brantford May Take Action.

BRANTFORD, Sept. 5.—(Special.)—The twelfth bi-annual session of the Federated Association of Letter Carriers opened this morning and will continue for at least two days. The objects of the association are to promote the welfare of the carrier service generally; the society also carries with it an insurance benefit against death. Delegates from all the cities of the Dominion will be in a free delivery area in attendance.

The business to be transacted includes ways and means whereby the carrier's remuneration will be paid letter carriers. The claim will be made principally on the increased cost of living in the several cities of the Dominion and the responsible and arduous duties performed. There is also a grievance in some cities caused by the hours of work being extended above what is considered to be reasonable and fair. A contrast has been drawn between the Canadian letter carrier and the letter carrier in the United States. The Canadian gets from \$1.25 to \$2.25 a day after several years' service. A large number of them who prefer to remain under the old act of 1882 get something like \$40 a month, and it is said, have had no increase in pay from fifteen to twenty years. The United States carrier gets \$600 his first year, \$800 his second, and \$1000 his third year, and in addition at the last congress a bill was passed whereby the clerks in the United States postoffice are advanced to the same grade of salary as is paid the letter carriers, and on July 1 all officers of the first class were advanced to \$1100, and on July 1 next all officers of this class will receive \$1200. In addition to this a definite scheme of promotion has been set forth, whereby carriers and clerks are to receive promotion successively to all higher grades in the service. The hours of work are defined at 48 hours per week. Recommendations were also made by the postmaster-general to give all permanent employees thirty days annual leave, exclusive of Sundays.

It is said the Canadian letter carriers are very much dissatisfied with their present condition, and small increase of pay in sickness or accident, and loss of ten days' holiday each year. The recent legislation in England, and the definite system of promotion open to letter carriers, and there is no Saturday half-holiday.

Respectful petitions and memorials and deputations have waited upon the several postmaster-generals during the past eighteen years, but it is said no practical results have been obtained.
