IT WILL BE A HOTLEGAL FIGHT IN BOW-STREET

If the Invaders of the Transvaal are Sent Up for Trial-A Case Where Precedent Will Have to be Made-Many Women Want to Marry Jameson, Who Hates

New York, March 1.—Mr. Isaac N. Ford cables from London to The Tribune: The excitement over Dr. Jameson has subsided as rapidly as it rose. Public comment on the case is excluded by the excellent practice of the English press when an important trial is pending. Dr. Jameson, who is naturally a reticent man has wisely retired from public view, and takes no notice to letters or cards sent to him. Several offers of marriage are said to have awaited his coming, but he is devoting his attention to courting of another sort. Sir John Bridge's worning was heeded by his officers, and no theatrical exhibition of jingoism has followed the first scene in court. The form of legal procedure which will be adopted is not yet known with precision, but it is probable that, if Dr. Jameson and his officers are indicted and committed for trial in consequence of the preliminary enquiry before Sir John Bridge, the case will come before the Old Bailey Sessions, with three judges and a special jury. The legal questions will be only partly disclosed in the opening enquiry, but these are likely to be of paramount importance.

What the Defence Will Bo.

The defence will evidently make a great effort to invalidate on technical grounds any indictment based upon the Foreign Enlistment Act. It is not likely that the military officers with Jameson will be court martialed; indeed, the Army Act seems to exclude a subsequent trial, since it provides that no officer subject to military law can be prosecuted for any offence after conviction or acquittay by a civil court.
