CROOKED BAGGAGE MASTER.

Angus Chisholm, of the Intercolonial,
Was the Ringleader of Bogus
Money Vendors.

FIVE YEARS IN PENITENTIARY

Is the Sentence Imposed in His
Case—Six Other Formerly Re-
spectable Men Punished.

Amherst, N.S., Nov. 17.—Seven men were
arraigned before Judge Morse today ac-
cused of being engaged in the circulation
of counterfeit \$2 Dominion notes. The case
has caused a great sensation on account
of all those implicated being well known
and hitherto regarded as honest and respect-
able citizens. The whole seven elected to be
tried summarily, and five of them were
disposed of today.

Angus Chisholm, of Truro, baggage-master
on the Intercolonial Railway, was first ar-
raigned on the charge of having in his pos-
session \$200 of counterfeit \$2 bills. He
pleaded guilty and was sentenced to five
years in the penitentiary. In delivering sen-
tence, Judge Morse charged him with be-
ing responsible for the whole of the wretched
business. He had solicited and induced
the other men, all of whom were respect-
able citizens, to enter into the business.

The Other Culprits.

James Douglas of Chester, James Bar-
clay of Wentworth and Wilson Meyer of
Wentworth each pleaded guilty to having
in his possession sums of from \$200 to \$500,
and were each fined \$100 or one year in
jail.

Arthur Stewart of MacCaig pleaded
guilty to having two forged bills, and was
sentenced to pay a fine of \$100 or three months
in jail. Neil Barclay pleaded guilty to hav-
ing \$17 in forged notes, and Thomas Little
\$100. The latter two were remanded until
Friday for sentence. In imposing fines,
Judge Morse said he believed that this, with
the fact of these men living in the com-
munity where the business was transacted,
would be a far greater punishment than to
sentence them to months or years in prison,
and as they had been led on to do this
instead of a term in prison.

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BOURASSA BOBS UP AGAIN.

He Is Not Yet Satisfied About the
Great Constitutional Question re-
the Contingent.

WANTS NO IMPERIAL FEDERATION.

Yet He Favors British Connection—
Opposes Participation in Im-
perial Quarrels.

Montreal, Nov. 17.—(Special).—Mr. Bour-
rassa, ex-M.P. for Labelle, would have been
forgotten long since had he not written let-
ters to the newspapers. Here is his latest,
published in La Verite, of Quebec:

"Papeineville, Nov. 17, 1939.
Sir,—You publish the resolution adopted
by the electors of Labelle, approving
my attitude on the constitutional ques-
tion raised by our military expedition to
South Africa, and you say: 'what do
you think?' Only we shall add that for
us, the electors of Labelle, the Imperial
Federation, even with the right of representa-
tion in the Imperial Council, is not
of any kind of Imperial Federation.
I desire the maintenance of the British
Empire, but I never decided in favor
of any kind of Imperial Federation.
I see therein an obstacle to absorption
by the United States, and this is not
in the opinion that Canada is not
not yet ready for it. If our constitu-
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
