These overtures are said to have coincided with Lord Rosebery's own matured view that the time has come to build out of the ruin of the Liberal party a new Imperialist Liberal party divorced alike from parochialism and faddism, and purged of Home Rule. With such a program and with Lord Rosebery in active leadership, this new party would, it is estimated, meet Parliament next month 150 strong in the House of Commons; while one session of strenuously conducted opposition would, it is asserted, compel the government to attempt to save itself from disintegration by appealing to the country.

This is the extreme view of Lord Rosebery's intentions. The most general belief is that he will not attempt at the present moment to lead a political revolution, but content himself, while criticising severely the management of the war, with urging the patient support of the government yet a little longer.


