

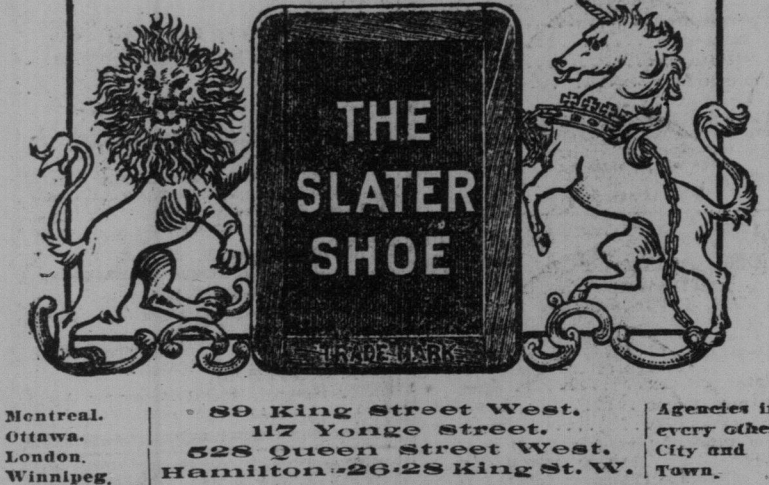

ESTATE OF H. S. HOWLAND. MR. CHARLTON ALARMED.

Provision for Disposal of \$326,063 Made By His Will.

Henry Stark Howland died Jan. 28 last, leaving an estate valued at \$326,063, made up as follows: Interests in H. S. Howland Sons & Co. and Graham & Sons, \$163,800; stocks, \$50,443; real estate, \$40,075; assets at Kleinburg, other than real estate, \$20,411; miscellaneous assets, \$2,900. All the estate of Mr. Howland, including that of his deceased wife, which passed to him as administrator, is to be apportioned in this way: A stock company is to be formed out of all the proceeds of the realty and personally the stock to be equally divided among the surviving children, the son, Peleg, to accept such as will cover his interest in the present firm. All amounts owing to Mr. Howland by his children are to be treated as paid, and shall be wiped out. The son, Peleg, is to be president under the new management, and George William Pierce and Thompson Smith shall be directors. Peleg is to manage the hardware business, William and Thompson the Kleinburg business, and George the mail works. The other children shall also be directors. The son, George, shall be paid as a creditor of the estate whatever sum is at his credit in connection with the mail works, and creditors of the estate, William and Thompson are to be paid as such, in addition to \$2000 each. Each of his daughters also gets \$1000, in addition to her share. The son, Frank, is named as the Toronto agent of the Kleinburg business. The shares given to the daughters during their lives are to be held by the trustees until their death, when the will of the daughters shall bestow them.

George Christopher Husband, wholesale merchant, made his wife the sole legatee under his will. The estate consists of \$4000 in the firm of Husband Bros. & Co., \$75 in debts and \$2000 life insurance.

## SKAGWAY WANTS RELIEF

Asking That Customs Regulations Be Made By the Canadian Government at That Point.

## CLAIMS BENEFIT FOR THE YUKON

Could Break Bulk and Ship Goods Into Interior as They Are Required.

Secretary Jarvis of the Board of Trade received yesterday a letter from the Skaguay Chamber of Commerce, asking co-operation in obtaining customs regulations for Skaguay.

The letter is as follows: "We ask your co-operation in obtaining from your government suitable customs regulations at Skaguay that will permit the warehousing in bond and subsequent re-entry of Canadian goods into Canada in broken bulk, as the trade may require. The immense benefits that the people of the Canadian Yukon would derive from such a customs regulation are too self-evident to require more than a mere mention.

"Dealers could hold their stocks in bond at Skaguay, breaking the bulk as demanded by their trade, and, relieved of the necessity of ordering their entire invoice from a distance of a thousand miles further away than the port of Skaguay, would be under no necessity of carrying large sums of money in the high freight between Skaguay and interior points. It would further obviate the necessity of buying beyond current needs, as under these circumstances Canadian wholesalers would certainly carry adequate stocks in bond at Skaguay.

"The benefit to the Dominion at large would be no means be inconsiderable. The impetus thus given to Canadian trade would displace United States goods in the Skaguay market by enabling merchants of this city to fill their orders with Canadian goods. The business which Skaguay now carries on with the Canadian interior consists almost solely of filling orders to satisfy the requirements of trade that cannot wait for shipments from Vancouver. Under present circumstances this trade, which is the aggregate is by no means inconsiderable, must apply to dutiable merchandise into the United States. The merchants of Skaguay could not find it profitable to do business with an interior patronage with dutiable merchandise. An arrangement of this kind would, moreover, greatly tend to obliterate border-line feeling over matters of present international controversy."

The letter will be brought before the Council of the Board.

**The Royal Naval Review at Spithead**

In honor of the coronation of His Majesty the King, Saturday, June 28, 1902, the R.M.S. "Norham Castle" will leave Tilbury on the evening of Friday, the 27th June, for Spithead.

A special train in connection with this vessel will start from St. Pancras for Tilbury at 6 p.m. on that day.

On her arrival at Spithead on Saturday morning, the 28th June, the "Norham Castle" will take up the position allotted her by the Admiralty, and her passengers will have an opportunity of witnessing the inspection of the fleet by His Majesty the King, and the illuminations in the evening.

**HE CALLED EGYPT BRITISH**

Lord Salisbury's Declaration in His London Speech of High Significance.

**EMPIRE CLAIMS THE COUNTRY**

Premier's Words Aimed to Put an End to Efforts to Embarrass Lord Cromer.

London, May 12.—Lord Salisbury's prominent reference to Egypt in his Albert Hall speech has more than ordinary significance. It was the first public occasion when a responsible British statesman used language equivalent to a declaration that Egypt was a part of the dominions of the Crown.

So far as British claims affect the case, there is an end of the fiction of temporary occupation, which had existed for nearly twenty years. It is understood that the Premier's emphatic pronouncement was intended to put an end to efforts and reports designed to embarrass Lord Cromer, the British representative at Cairo.

For a year or so the Egyptian capital has been the headquarters of an anti-British movement deriving its support about equally from Constantinople and national circles in Paris.

**Khedive Their Victim.**

The original plan of the leaders was to work upon the vanity and ambition of Abbas Pasha and induce him to appeal to the powers against England.

This failed, and the failure is believed to have been due largely to the sensible advice given the Khedive by his mother, who pointed out that the session of Egypt was vital to Britain's desire, and that any issue over this question would be decided in her favor.

Having failed in that part of the scheme, its promoters devoted itself to the sowing of seeds of discontent among the peasants. They carried pamphlets showing the nature and scope of the Egyptian working classes would welcome the help of France.

Undertakings of this sort, while they could have no serious result, tend to revive the old controversy among the British government and a sweeping declaration of sovereignty over Egypt.

**FORD MURDER DEPLICATED.**

Paris, May 12.—The assassination of Paul Leclercq Ford had an exact counterpart in Paris on the same day on which it occurred in New York. Edmond de Morny shot his brother, Gustave, in the latter's house after a refusal of money, committing suicide at a small railway station three hours after. The murderer was a former army officer and the victim a distinguished writer upon military topics.

**Britain Deserves It.**

London, May 12.—The Parliamentary Secretary of the Foreign Office, Lord Cranborne, has instructed the British Ambassador at Washington, Lord Pauncefoot, to renew the representations made in 1900 in regard to discrimination against the United Kingdom in the matter of paintings and statuary. The Foreign Office considers that Great Britain is entitled to the same five per cent. remission of duty as the United States according to France, Germany, Portugal and Italy.
