

He had received many concessions from the Russian Government, in the way of furnishing armories' supplies. The court officials saw a way out of the impending scandal thru him. He was introduced to the lady, who was now partly ostracized by the other court ladies, especially by those who were on particularly friendly terms with the cartina. A marriage of convenience was arranged between Easmin and Miss Arnot. The marriage took place.

To show how small this world is, there is a business man in Toronto who came in contact indirectly with young Easmin, or, as he was known then by the name of Siminsky, a Russian way of pronouncing the English name. The Toronto man, along with a number of others was representing English firms anxious to do business with the Russian Government. They discovered that rival agents, who were friendly with Siminsky, managed to place large orders. He had a greater influence than the heads of the departments. The British Embassy was applied to. Enquiries and protests were made which resulted in Siminsky being reprimanded and receiving strict instructions to refrain from interfering in commercial business.

For the past two years, since his mother's death, Easmin has lived and not lived. He received some money from the sale of his mother's effects, which he used up. He landed in Philadelphia, ran some sort of a broker's office, left under cover, came to Toronto, and finished up in jail.
