New York, April 18.—Capt. R. L. MacHugh, of the First City of London Artillery, and special war correspondent of the London Daily Telegraph, accompanied by E. G. REPORT. New York, April 18.-A special to the World from Madrid, Spain, says: "The report of the Spanish commission of inquiry into the Maine calamity will be printed in full in the Official Gazette. A synopsis of it, furnished by the minister of marine, is printed in the Heraldo. This abstract indicates that the report is strongly drawn up to show that the explosion could not have been caused by a torpedo or by a mine of any kind, as none of the phenomena usually produced was noticed in the port of Havana at the time of the disaster or immediately afterward and that no trace of anything was found that could justify the theory of an outside explosion.

TORPEDO FLOTILLA. New York, April 17.-A dispatch to the World from St. Vincent, Cape de Verde Islands, says: The torpedo flotilla, under the guardianship of the armored cruisers Christobal Colon and Infanta Maria Teresa, still remains anchored in the bay here, ready to sail, but without orders from Madrid. Still, it is very difficult to find a formula to allow Spain to renounce sovereignty over Cuba. The pope has renewed his efforts to convince the Madrid Government that although it may be painful to abandon the island, it is not dishonorable, Spain yielding to superior force. At the Vatican it is asserted that Austria and England have acted on the same lines, encouraging Spain to submit to the inevitable and abandon Cuba. They cite the recent example of Greece, which rejected the disinterested advice of the powers.
