Researches That May Lead to Lord Reay and General Porter Have Heated Passage Over

Contraband.

The Hague, July 27.—The discussion of contraband of war at the peace, conference yesterday occasioned a breeze between Lord Reay (British). and General Porter, which, though insignificant, is being commented upon in the light of its effect on international politics, and as an indication that Anglo-American relations are becoming strained, while the Triple Alliance in general and Germany in parfriendly toward the United States. Lord Reay expressed profound surprise at the attitude of the United States, and quoted various documents. notably a note addressed by Secretary. of State Marcy on July 17, 1897, to employing practically the same arguments that Great Britain now emcontraband. General Porter, somewhat excitedly, retorted that he preferred President Roosevelt's more modern policy to Marcy's antiquated arguments.
