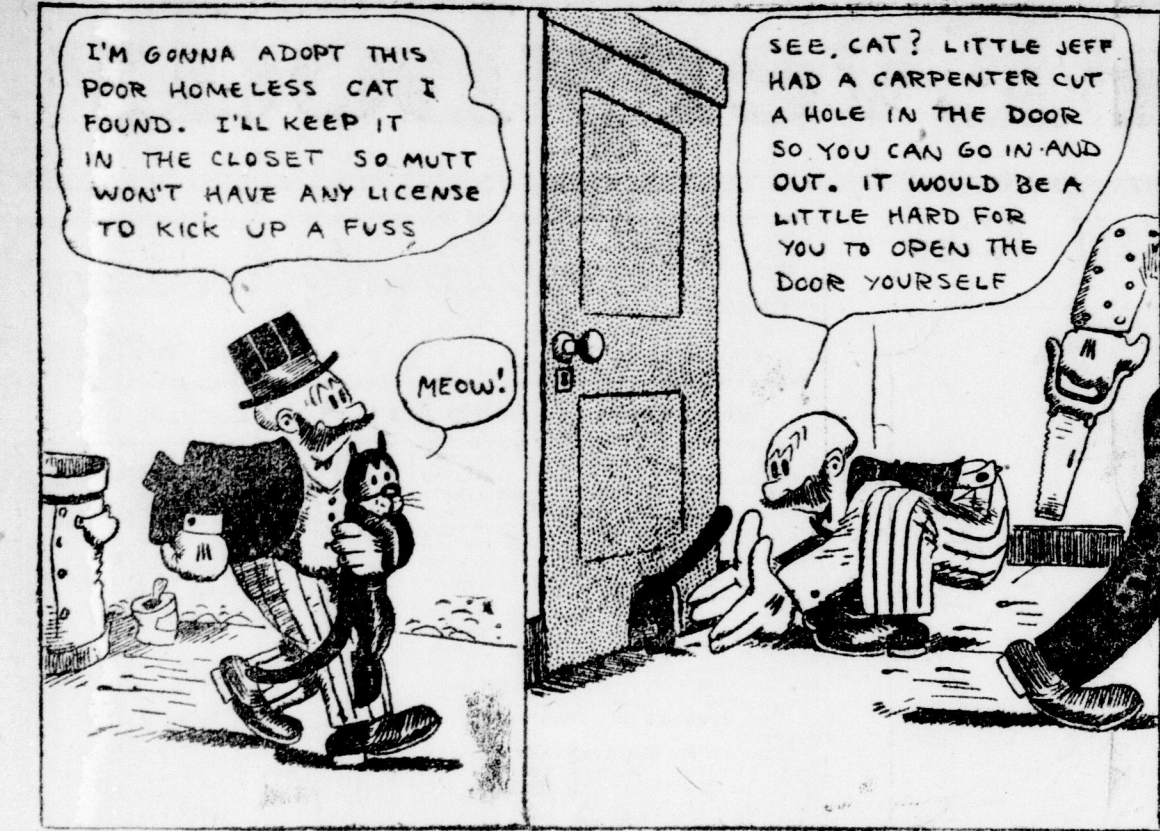
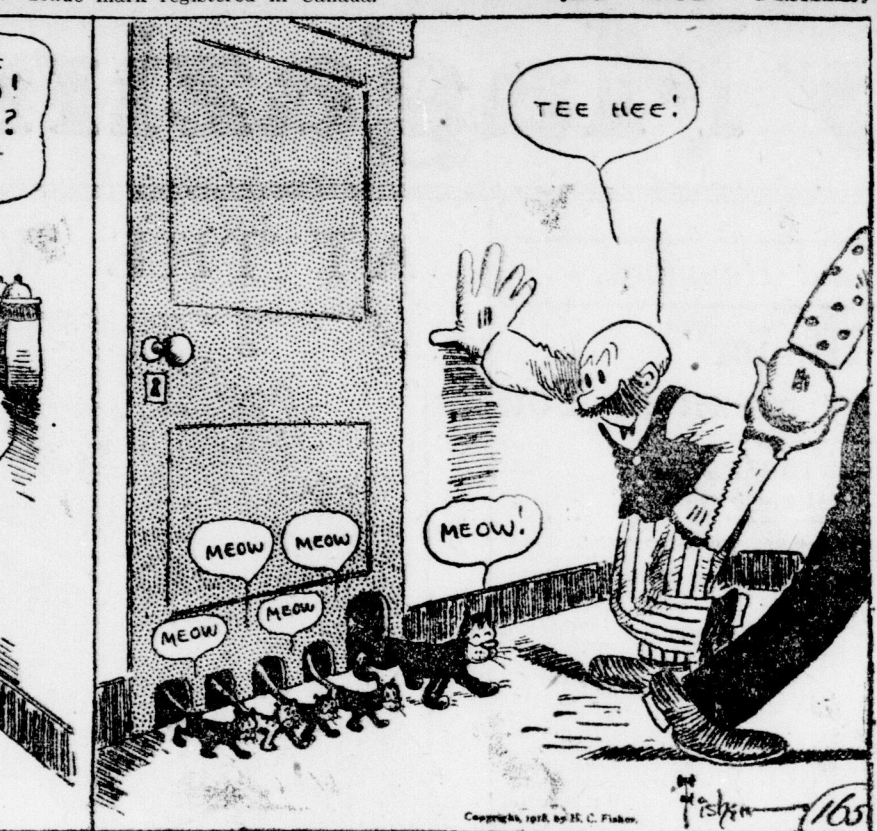

STEEPLECHASING NOT SO DANGEROUS SPORT AS MANY IMAGINE

Jockey Says Riders Seldom Injured When Horses Fall Going Over.

Steeplechase racing though one of the most fascinating of sports is not as dangerous as it looks, declares Harry Yourell, former steeplechase rider. "The public is not aware of the fact that nine times out of ten when a horse falls over the fence, the rider is not in any danger as it looks," says Yourell. "The force of the fall usually throws him away from the horse. The greatest danger to the rider is when the horse stumbles or makes a bad landing. Then it is almost impossible to stay on his back and the rider is in great danger of being injured as he is thrown over the head of the horse and may get struck by the front or back feet of the horse while it is trying to recover its footing. There is no such thing as a sure jumper. During my career as a steeplechase rider I have never seen a horse which has never fallen as a jumper. A horse named Lightning, who was a jumper for five years before meeting me, fell over the head of the fence and was never finished without a rider at some length of the race."
