LABOR-SAVING DEVICES.

Food, fuel, money and labor-saving devices of the latest invention, may be seen at the Hydro-Electric exhibit in the Crystal Palace at the Western Fair. After the clothes have been taken from the copper tub, put through wringer into the rinse water in the stationary tub directly in back of it; the clothes may then be taken from the rinse water and passed through the wringer into the blue

water in the adjoining stationary tub. The washing process may be continued without interruption while the clothes that have been washed are being rinsed, blueed and passed through wringer.

SIR WILLIAM MACKENZIE HAS INCOME OF \$225,000

Premier Hearst's Income Assessed at \$12,500.

TORONTO, Sept. 10.—The assessment rolls for No. 3 ward, which have just been handed over to the city clerk, show that Sir William Mackenzie is still to enjoy the distinction of paying municipal taxes on the highest income entered on Toronto's rolls. His income assessment for 1918 is \$225,000, so that his income tax to the city will be over \$8,750. The Premier of the province pays taxes on his comparatively modest assessment of \$12,500. Most of his colleagues at Queen's Park apparently contend that their residence is outside of Toronto, and thus escape taxation here.

NATIVE OF ENGLAND.

INGERSOLL, Sept. 10.—Charles Clark, aged 73 years, died today at his home here. He was born at Chisleham, Essex, England, and came to Canada 45 years ago, having resided here almost continuously, following the busi-

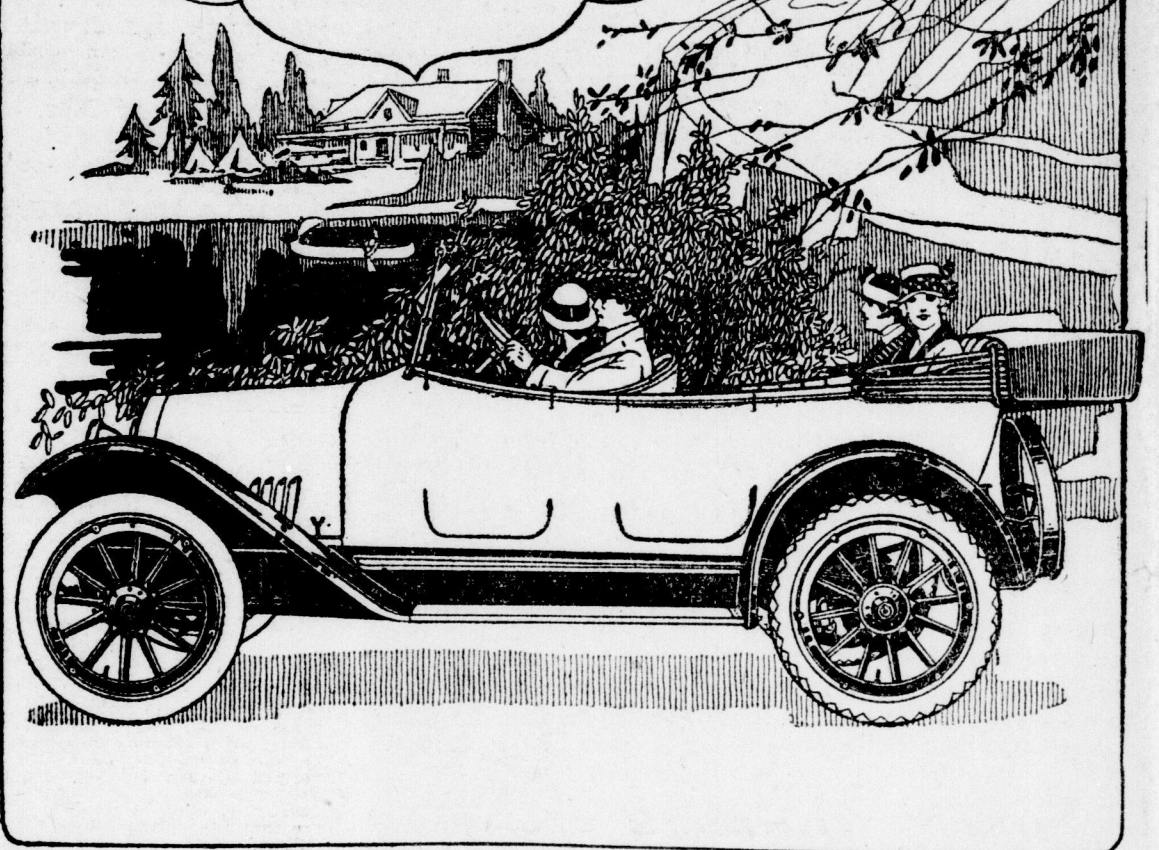
