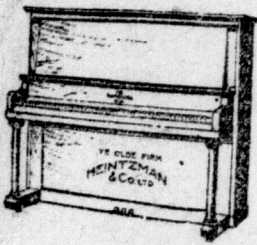


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The trend of living today, especially in the larger towns and cities, is towards smaller quarters. Hence the growing number of families who seek the apartment and duplex house for a home.

Here Are Some Helpful Complexion Hints

The beauty, or at least the charm of your face, is most largely determined by the texture and quality of your skin. Nothing is quite so attractive as a clear, fresh skin. It need not be pink and white or have the thinness of a baby's skin. It is clear and transparent, as a healthy skin always is, and free from blotches and eruptions, it can not help being a joy.

Needless to say, diet is essential to a good complexion. Diet and exercise—the two go hand in hand in the correction of bodily imbalances. No one should be so unreasonable as to expect that she can indulge her fondness for all sorts of pastries, richly spiced food, and curled-up-on-the-sofa-novel reading with a box of chocolates without easy reach and at the same time possess a smooth, clear complexion.

Dieting alone will not give a good complexion. You must exercise eyes

tematically and persistently to keep your skin lovely and attractive. You work for awhile if they mean something on exercise.

There are some local treatments for your face that will prove beneficial to your complexion. After your face has been exposed to dust or other impurities, gently over your face and neck with the tips of your fingers. Let a film of cream remain for about ten minutes, and then bathe your face in warm water and use a pure soap, or saponaceous powders if your face is extremely tender. Then rinse your face with cold water and finish with a thorough rinsing. Careful attention to your diet and sufficient outdoor exercise should rid you of any pimples you may have. Plenty of pure drinking water and sufficient sleep are also necessary to the beauty of your complexion, and will help overcome a tendency to pimples.

If you have blackheads, wash your face at night in warm, soapy water, using a soft bristle complexion brush. Rub the brush just as you would a wash water, then with cold water. A marked improvement.

If at the end of this time you still have persistent blackheads remove them by first softening your skin with warm water and then inserting in the blackhead the point of a fine needle which has been sterilized in a flame. Gently puncturing the blackhead, gently press to close the pore.

If your pores are enlarged in addition to the blackheads, try this: Bathe your face in warm water, dry it, and then apply a mixture of:

Soup liniment 2 ounces
Rub this thoroughly into your skin. After it has been on for an hour wash in soap and water and rinse well so that not a particle of soap remains on your face.
