Mr. Hughes said that the children's court as now conducted here was simply a trial and that there was no attempt made to mould the lives of the youthful offenders. The inspector spoke of an institution in Mansfield, Ohio, which received young men between the ages of 16 and 30 years, as a model method of reclaiming the wayward. He also cited, to show how effective was the children's court in Salt Lake City, that a store-keeper who had sold cigarets to a minor was traced and sent to jail for three months. Mr. Hughes said that a special magistrate and two officers would be required, and estimated that the yearly cost to the city would be about \$2500.

# AT EVERY FLAG STATION

General Manager Appears Before Commission in Opposition to Winnipeg Shippers' Request

D. McNicholl, general manager of the Canadian Pacific Railway, was a witness before the Dominion Railway Commission yesterday. He addressed the commission in regard to the application of the Winnipeg Jobbers' and Shippers' Associations that facilities be provided at all flag stations for unloading and taking care of passengers and freight. Mr. McNicholl objected to a general order.

Conditions varied, he said, at different points, and were an order is-sued along the lines of the application

of the Winnipeg Association, it would necessitate the appointment of an agent for every flag station and an enormous expenditure. The company wished to accommodate the public, but to ask it to keep an agent at every station where only an occasional passenger alighted was unfair. When the stations ceased to pay, why should the stations ceased to pay, why should not the railway be at liberty to with-draw the agent? They had withdrawn not the railway be at liberty to withdrawn draw the agent? They had withdrawn many agents because it had been found in many cases that the business originating at them was not sufficient to pay the agent's salary. It had been said that the earnings of a station should be the basis of decisions whether or not there should be an agent. This was not possible. There were no earnings at any station. The earnings were in the haulage.

To build a station at every flag station would be a useless waste of money. They would never get enough out of it to pay for the depreciation. To get out sets of tickets for such stations and to enumerate them all in the timetables would involve very large and unprofitable expenditures. Passengers from such stations were able to get their tickets on the train.


