From the eighty-eight to the eighty-ninth the ice was very large and the surface was less irregular, but in other respects it was about the same as below the eighty-seventh. We no longer had also an extension of the range of vision. We seemed to see longer distances and the ice along the horizon had a less angular outline. The color of the sky and the ice also changed to deeper purple blues. We had no way of checking these impressions by other observation; the eagerness to find something unusual may have fired the imagination, but since the earth is flattened at the pole perhaps a widened horizon should be detected.
