

MEIGHEN SHOWING NO QUARTER TO KING

Tour of Premier, Especially in Yale, Is Triumphant—Scores Opponents.

Penticton, B.C., Nov. 3.—(Special)—In the leader of an election fight the prime minister is hitting with his parliamentary vigor and is showing no quarter to Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King and his supporters.

Again, at Summerland, he referred to the leader and opponents of the government as those "whose idea of liberty was to let other people fight for them."

The prime minister's tour thru Yale had been a great triumph. This constituency was endangered by a lack of attention by the previous representative and by an attempt to consolidate against the government the Farmers, Liberals, Soldiers and Labor.

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The chief features of the prime minister's tour in contrast with that of the opposition leader are the open affiliation with his party of former political opponents.

Colonel Esiger, a Liberal candidate, was accorded time at tonight's meeting, but after taking his place on the platform refused to speak beyond repudiating Hon. T. A. Crea's leadership.

SOVIET FREE BRITISH, WIRES TORONTO OFFICER

St. Catharines, Ont., Nov. 3.—(By Canadian Press)—That the ultimatum of the British government for the immediate release of the British officers who have been prisoners of the soviet authorities in Russia, has been effective, is indicated by a cablegram received in St. Catharines today by A. D. McMillan from his brother, Capt. Emerson McMillan, a Canadian engineer, who, with other British officers, were on Admiral Kolchak's staff when the anti-Bolshevik leader was taken prisoner and afterwards executed.

BRITISH POETESS DEAD

London, Nov. 3.—Louise Imogen Ege, well known as a poet and essayist, died yesterday at Chipping Campden. She published several volumes of poems and other works, including "Goosecup Papers," "Robert Emmet, His Rebelion and His Romance," "A Little English Gallery." She edited various publications and had contributed to many magazines since 1885.

HAMILTON

Hamilton, Nov. 3.—Members of the local fire, police and jail committees divided this evening to support the city council's London, Brantford and Stratford in petitioning the provincial government to dispense with the legislation granting all firemen one day off in seven, which was passed last spring and is to become effective on January 1 of next year.

PENITENTIARY AND THE LASH IS SENTENCE OF PRISMA

Quebec, Nov. 3.—Jack Collins, found guilty of robbery with violence in the court of King's bench, was sentenced this morning by Chief Justice Lemieux to ten years in the penitentiary and twelve strokes of the lash. Collins, in company with three others, attacked and badly beat a man called Proulx, and robbed him. The men came to Quebec from Montreal, in a motor car and jumped from it and attacked Proulx in Crown street. They were frightened away by the arrival of the police.

Oklahoma City, Okla., Nov. 3.—A woman representative congress from Oklahoma became a reality tonight when belated returns gave victory to Alice M. Robertson, a Republican, over W. W. Hastings, Democratic incumbent, in the second district.
