Britain and Her Dominions Have Special Treaty Arrangement.

DIFFERENT WITH U. S.

Washington, Dec. 30.—(Reuter's).—Senator Lodge's statement, in the course of a speech delivered in Philadelphia recently, that there was reason to believe that the British dominions bordering on the Pacific would co-operate with the United States in the addition of a uniform policy of restricting Asiatic immigration, is understood to have been rather with a purpose of developing the sentiment of the people of the dominions as well as of the Californians on this subject than with any idea of causing negotiations to be initiated at this time to bring about this result.

SOVIET EMISSARY PROMOTED REVOLT

Small, was sued here today for \$2,500 by the Burns Detective Agency. The suit is based on the charge that Richardson took the circular thru which Doughty was identified from the office of the Burns Agency.

F. R. Lennon, Manager of Film Agency; Fred Deville, an Advertising Man, and Fred Osborne, Former Janitor of Grand Opera House, Say Doughty Suggested Plan to Extort Money From Small—Doughty, in Signed Statement, Asserts Ignorance of Small's Fate, and Denies Intent to Steal Bonds—Prisoner Committed for Trial on Charge of Theft.

After a preliminary hearing lasting the greater part of yesterday afternoon, John Doughty, former secretary to Ambrose J. Small, missing theatrical manager, was committed for trial on a charge of theft by Col. T. Denison in the police court. On the second charge preferred by the crown, that of conspiring to kidnap his former employer, the case was adjourned until Monday morning next at 10 o'clock. Ten witnesses gave evidence, including Fred Osborne, former janitor of the Grand Opera House, where Small's offices were situated; Fred Deville, Walter Kennedy, E. W. M. Plock, of London, Ont., who formerly acted as Small's legal advisor; Mrs. A. Small, Detective-Sergeant Mitchell and James Cowan, manager of the Grand. Col. Denison heard the case, while Col. R. H. Greer conducted the prosecution for the crown, and I. F. Hellmuth, K.C., acted as counsel for the defence.

On committing Doughty for trial on the charge of theft of Canadian Victory (bearer) bonds to the amount of \$100,000, Col. Denison said that he could not help thinking that the accused knew something about the disappearance of Small, adding that the case as it stands now is very complicated. The colonel was doubtful whether there was enough evidence on which to convict if the case was taken to another court; even though there was sufficient to warrant a committal for trial. Nevertheless, it was a case which should be thoroughly investigated and he reluctantly ordered a committal.

Want Newboy's Story. A great deal of the evidence tended to show that Doughty had been the last to see his employer alive, but there were certain stories told by a newboy with a stand on the corner of Yonge and Adelaide streets, who claimed that on the night of December 2 last, or the night on which Small disappeared, the missing man had stopped to buy some papers from him; this, too, at a later hour than when Small was presumably with Doughty. The newboy's story had never been fully investigated, and although the colonel was doubtful whether the boy could really remember the incident definitely enough to make his evidence of any weight, the charge of conspiracy to kidnap was adjourned until Monday in order that the newboy's story might be heard.

Janitor Alleges Offer. Fred Osborne, former janitor, was the first witness called, who testified that on the night of December 2 last, he saw Small in the office on a scheme with three of Doughty's men. "and you'll be able to live on your little farm for the rest of your life and nobody will be able to catch you."

Talked of Kidnapping. "Bud" Lennon, film exchange manager, who resides at the St. Charles Hotel, told the court that he never heard of Small's disappearance. Doughty had had with him a short time before Small disappeared. Doughty had told him that he was going to make a profit from Small had been making.

When speaking to you regarding Small, did Doughty use the word 'kidnap' asked Col. Denison. Mr. Lennon: "Yes. He said that if Small could be put away he could extort money from him to which he was entitled."

"Did he make any proposition to you?" "None whatever."

Col. Denison: "Anything as to how Small was taken?"
