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ABBOTSFORD. A new settlement that district known as Matsqui Dyked Lands. Riverside, in the same vicinity, is the nearest post office.

ABERDEEN. A fishing village on the north bank of the Skeena river, about 500 miles north-west of Victoria. Fishing is the chief industry. Steamboat connection with Skeena and all points on the coast. Population 25. Mail monthly.

AGASSIZ. (Formerly Ferny Coombe). A station on the CPR, in the Districts of Yale and Kootenay, 72 miles east of Vancouver, the nearest banking point. The Dominion Experimental Farm is located here. Produce is the principal shipment. Stage twice daily to Harrison, Hot Springs. Population 200. Telephone communication. Telegraph, CPR. Express, Dominion. Mail daily. L A Agassiz, postmaster.

AINSWORTH. (Formerly called Hot Springs.) A mining town on the shores of Lake Kootenay, in the Yale Kootenay district, about 30 miles east of Nelson, which is the nearest banking point; It has large smelting works in the vicinity, and is connected with Revelstoke on the C P R and all intermediate points by a regular line of steamboats. It has also a Methodist church and a weekly newspaper, and forms a basis of supplies for a large district round. Telephone communication. Population 500. R. F Green, postmaster
