DIRECTORS' REPORT.

The Directors of the Halifax Protestant Industrial School beg to present their report for the year.

The work of this Institution has been carried on during the past year about as usual. We began with 38 boys on the register, 12 of whom left, their time having expired, two were removed by death, Edward Covey, of consumption, and Lewis Fraser, of Brights disease. The lad Covey was buried from the Home and interred in the School lot at Camp Hill, the other boy was buried by his parents. Covey had been two years and a-half in the Home and was of great assistance to the Supt. Fraser had only been in the Home two months and was sick when he entered.

Several of the boys whose time had expired were provided with situations; three left for the United States, who are doing well and give satisfaction to their employers.

12 new pupils were admitted during the year, so that we have now 31 under our charge.

BEHAVIOUR.

The behaviour of the boys has been, with two exceptions, all that could be desired.

RELIGIOUS TRAINING.

The clergymen connected with the Board have secured good workers for the Sabbath School, who attend regularly and their labors are much appreciated by the Board and the boys.
