BILLETING IN RURAL DISTRICTS

Recruits May Be Allowed to Stay in Own District

SYSTEM FOR FUTURE CALLS

Expected That New Order Will Stimulate Enlisting in Country Sections - Has Been Tried in Ontario

Hitherto the recruiting for the Canadian contingents has been mostly done at large centres and for the recruiting of the 100,000 Canadian troops at present under arms, the larger centres are responsible. In case more men are called for within a short time it is understood that a better opportunity will be provided for those living in the rural districts to enlist. For this purpose the system of billeting will be introduced. It is understood that a plan is under consideration by means of which the small centres with a population under 4000, containing a population under 4000, relating 100 men will be allowed to have the recruits billeted therein. Each small village centre raising twenty men will be allowed to have the recruits billeted therein.

Each incorporated village centre of a thousand and upwards raising fifty men will be allowed to retain them. Each centre with a population under 4000, relating 100 men will be allowed to have the recruits billeted therein. Each centre of upwards of four thousand recruiting a full company of 200 men will be allowed to make the same arrangements.

The mere raising of the required number of men will not, however, be sufficient. They will have to be medically fit, properly attested and their history and record up to standard requirements. The men will be uniformed through the usual channel of the district stores.

The system of billeting since the present war started has been tried out in Lindsay only, the home town of the Minister of Militia, and it has met there with success. Seventy-five cents a day will be paid by the government for each soldier billeted. It is expected that this system will be of particular benefit during the winter months. The soldiers will be surrounded with home influences, which will tend to make the routine of military life less tedious.

From a recruiting standpoint the system will enable the authorities to get into districts which hitherto have contributed but few men and it will give more particularly the rural districts a greater opportunity to send men to the front. Thousands of cases have occurred where young men in out of the way rural localities wishing to enlist had to pay the railway fare to a recruiting centre and it is known that thousands of others have been deprived of their chance to join a regiment owing to the expense entailed in getting to the recruiting point.
