CAPTAIN BOY-ED IS OF TURKISH PARENTAGE

Washington, Nov. 26.—Captain Boy-Ed, naval attache at the German Embassy, is a typical German in appearance, despite the fact that his father was of Turkish origin. The Army and Navy, Metropolitan and Chevy Chase Clubs saw much of Capt. Boy-Ed before the war began, but the day hostilities commenced he hurried to New York and opened headquarters at the Ritz-Carlton Hotel.

Before the war had been going on a month, Capt. Boy-Ed was "brought into the limelight, where he has remained ever since. From a quiet, affable society leader and club favorite he became an aggressive, assertive German partisan, directing a campaign of publicity to create pro-German sentiment in the United States.

Capt. Boy-Ed is forty-three years old. He is the son of Mrs. Ida Boy-Ed, the most popular woman novelist in Germany. His father was Karl Boy-Ed, a wholesale merchant of Turkish specialties who died in 1884.
