Judge Armstrong's Last Case in Probate; Some Wise Advice

Points To Difficulties in Case Before Him, Because of No Will — Warm Appreciation of Registrar

In the probate court today the matter of the estate of Walter B. Campbell, formerly stable keeper, was taken up. He died intestate leaving his wife, Mary Elizabeth Campbell and the following next of kin, a sister, Sarah Day, widow of Charles Day of Lakewood, N. J.; the children of a deceased brother Nelson Campbell, namely Clara, wife of A. J. Loggie of Chatham, and Frederick Campbell of the western part of the United States; the daughters of a deceased brother Campbell and a son Stanley Campbell, all residing at Norton; and another son Harry of Hartford, Conn.; the children of a brother Edmund Campbell, namely, two sons Hober of Sussex and Warren of Amherst, and a daughter Georgianna wife of Percy H. Friars of St. John; also the children of a deceased brother Hiram, namely May and Percy Campbell of Moncton, and W. Roy Campbell of Campbellton. On the petition of the widow, she was appointed administratrix. Real estate consists of a property on the south side of Leinster street valued at \$4,000, subject to a mortgage of \$2,500; personally \$1,200; life insurance payable to the widow, \$1,000. J. D. Follard Lewis is proctor.

This being the last probate court case which would come before him, Judge Armstrong said he could not let the opportunity pass without expressing his appreciation of the very efficient and prompt manner in which Henry O. McInerney had performed his duties as registrar of the court, and appointed to office on the same day with himself, now more than seven years ago, they had worked together since with the utmost harmony and it was with great regret that he felt this official connection was now drawing to a close. LOCAL NEWS

FAIRVILLE WILL HAVE PLAY GROUND

There Was Some Talk of Turning Over Money to Red Cross or Other Fund But This Will Not be Done

The Lancaster Community Council met last evening and there was a representative attendance. Dr. J. V. Anglin occupied the chair. The meeting was held in the Provincial Hospital.

The report of the treasurer, J. J. Hennessy, showed a balance of \$128.20 last year on hand for the playground fund. The report of the secretary, J. J. Hennessy, showed a balance of \$128.20 in the Bank of Nova Scotia.

The question as to whether the playground should be opened this year was raised. Councillor John O'Brien favored turning over the money on hand to the Red Cross Society for some other patriotic purpose, contending that in this time of great national emergency the children should be prepared to sacrifice their pleasure in common with the general public.

Several members spoke along the same lines, but believed the community council was acting as trustees for the playground fund and should be expected to develop a healthy local citizenship, as it was for this purpose only it was collected.

It was moved by Rev. P. R. Hayward that playgrounds be opened and maintained in much the same manner as last year. This was seconded by W. J. Linton and carried.

A committee to engage a competent staff was named, and J. J. Hennessy and Walter Ross were appointed to arrange the practical management of the playground.

It will require at the outside about \$70 more than is now available to conduct the playground this year, and it does seem a pity that for such a small sum the children are to be deprived of their supervised play, said one of the active supporters of the movement at the close of the meeting, and "while no public appeal is to be made, owing to the war conditions, we hope that those citizens who are in a position financially will assist in making the playground a success for the fall holiday term. If enough funds are not forthcoming, the term will have to be shortened to correspond with the finances."

Last year was the first time Fairville attempted a playground and success was measured from the opening. An average attendance of 100 a day was reported and the news that the swing, teeters and a slide with other games will be in operation this year will no doubt gladden the hearts of many children who enjoyed themselves to the full last summer.
