## LORD CURZON DEPLORES "HAWKING" BRITISH TITLES

London, March 22.—(A. P. By Mail)—The hawking of peerages, knight-hoods and other titles, which has periodically shocked the British public, is again engaging the attention of the government. In the House of Lords recently Marquis Curzon said it is the intention of the government to introduce legislation in order to carry out some of the recommendations of the royal commission on honors. He declared grave uneasiness had been excited by the excessive number of additions to the peerage in recent years. Much suspicion had been created, he said, by the fact that titles in some cases were conferred upon persons whose claims rested solely upon the basis of large political contribution.

The foreign secretary deplored the existence of what he termed "touts" who were engaged in peddling honors to the highest bidder. He referred to this as a "deplorable, discreditable and ignominious phenomenon in our public life, which I hope will soon be eradicated."

At the last inquiry into the subject of the indiscriminate award of titles, it was disclosed that as high as \$100,000 was given for a baronetcy.

The General Electric Co. has announced a general advance in wages at West Lynn, Pittsfield, Schenectady, N. Y., and elsewhere. Over 80,000 workmen will be benefited.

Fire insurance rates on Roman Catholic churches and institutions have been increased from thirty-five to fifty per cent, according to a notification received by insurance men in Ottawa yesterday. Recent heavy losses and fear of future loss is the reason given for the increase.

Miss Hilda DeLong of Centerville has been declared winner of the Observer, Ltd.'s subscription contest and has been named "Miss Carleton." She also won the right to a trip to Montreal, Toronto and Niagara. Miss Fern McGoldrick of Hartland was the winner of the second prize \$100, and Mrs. Fred Grey of Hartland, third prize, \$75.

An increase expected to amount to about ten per cent. will go into effect in the mills of the International Paper Company on Sunday next, according to P. T. Dodge, the president. This will affect about 20,000 employees in Canada and the United States, Mr. Dodge said, and has been decided on account of increased living costs.

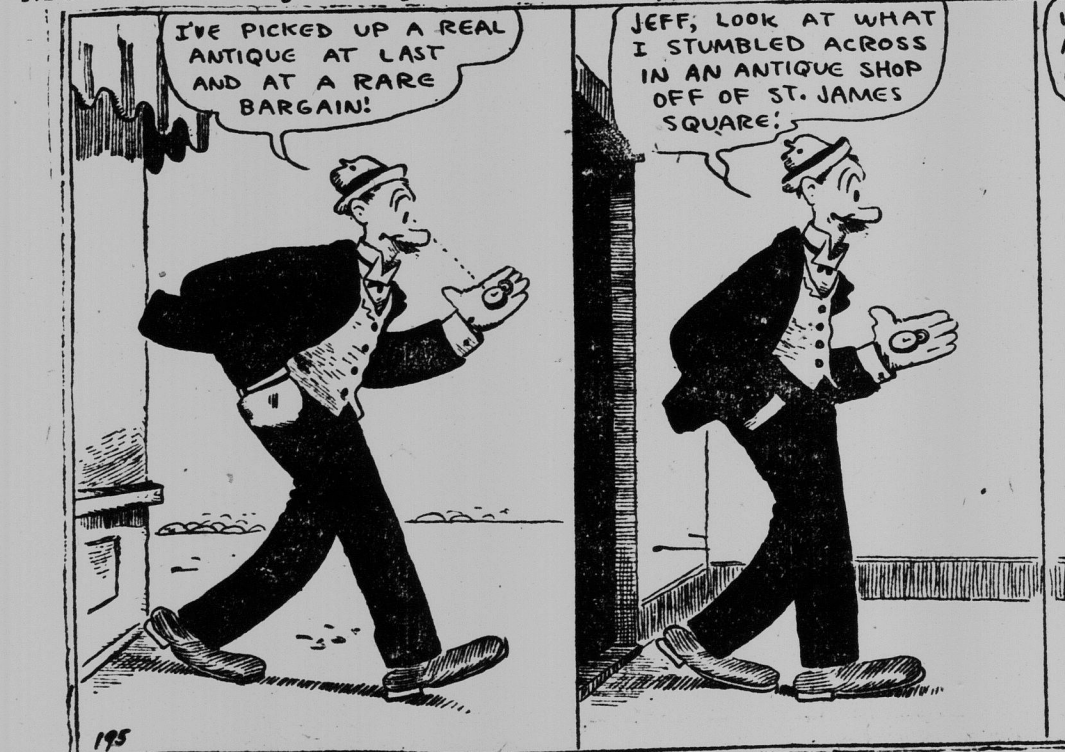

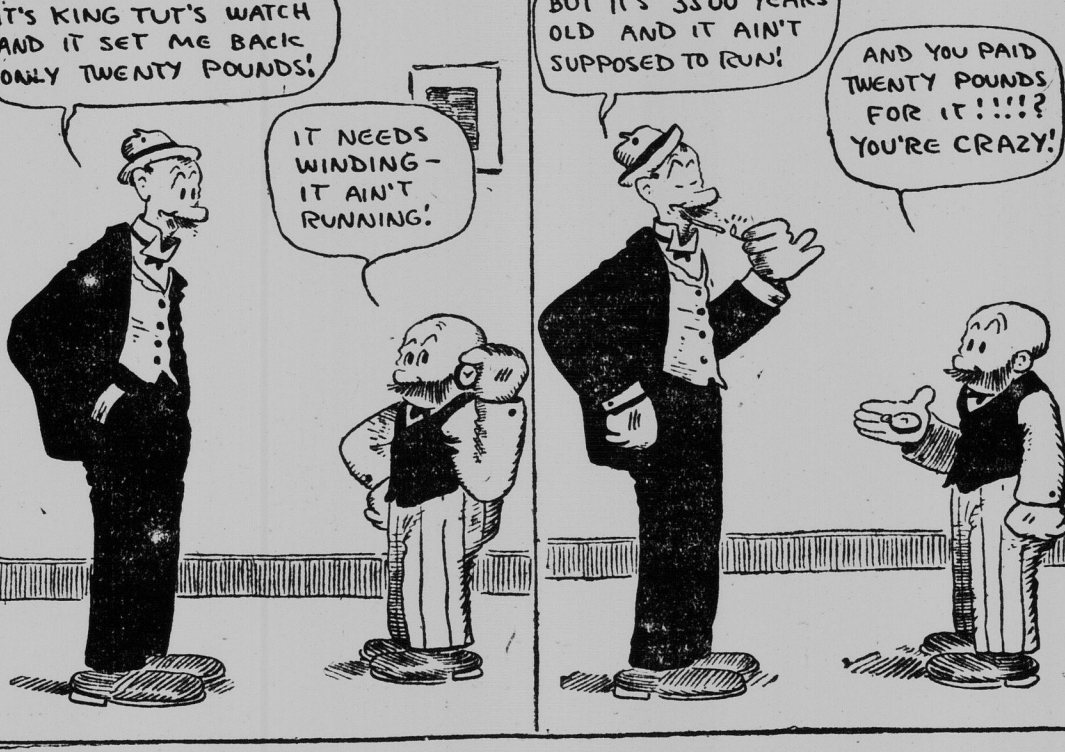
