Grand Trunk Bill on its Way in Upper House

WERE SUSPICIOUS THAT UNITED STATES HAD BETRAYED THEIR CODE

Former German Foreign Secretary Creates Mild Sensation at Investigation Berlin

Berlin, Nov. 7.—(By the Associated Press)—Dr. Alfred Zimmermann, secretary for foreign affairs during the war, caused a mild sensation during yesterday's session of the National Assembly committee investigation of the war, when he admitted that the German authorities had been surprised that the code, which had been made known to the American authorities, was betrayed to the Entente by the United States government.

ARREST CUE EXPERT IN CASE OF MESSENGER BOY WHO WAS SLAIN

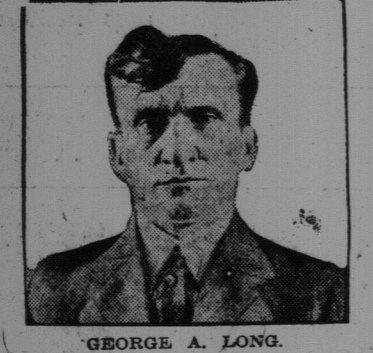
Berlin, Nov. 7.—(By the Associated Press)—A wireless message from Vienna reports that Archduke Otto is about to be proclaimed king of Hungary.

Hang From Windows, Screaming For Help
