Jingo Wins Asset Cup.
London, June 19.—(By Canadian Associated Press Cable)—The Asset gold cup was won today by Jingo at 8 to 1. Air Raid at 5 to 1, was second and Roamer at 30 to 1, was third. Four races in Moncton Races Filled Satisfactorily.

The classes in the Moncton races on July 1 and 2 have filled very satisfactorily. There are six entries in the free-for-all for which a \$1,000 purse has been hung up.

Sir Barton's Earnings.
Sir Barton, by his victory in the Belmont Stakes, earned the reputation of being the best colt of his age seen on the American turf in many years, and experts predict nothing can prevent him from winning \$100,000 or more this season if he remains in his present superb condition. By his victories in the Kentucky Derby, the Preakness and the Wither Stakes, he has earned for his owner, Commander Ross, \$53,400. The Belmont was worth \$11,500 net, so that his earnings to date reach the handsome total of \$65,900.

Commander Ross, accompanied by Mrs. Ross, his younger brother and a party of friends from Montreal, saw the contest from a box in the clubhouse enclosure, and after the race went to the track to meet the winner. He congratulated Jockey Loftus and Trainer Bedwell and was kept busy for the rest of the afternoon accepting the congratulations of his friends.

"I only let him run an eighth of a mile at the top of the stretch" was the comment of Jockey Loftus after the race.

Gibbons Third Time Victor.
Minneapolis, Minn., June 19.—Tommy Gibbons of St. Paul defeated Billy Miske, also of St. Paul, here tonight for the third consecutive time. Gibbons' superior boxing ability earned him a popular decision in a ten round bout. A fight between Sam Langford and Bill Tate, arranged for ten rounds, was stopped in the fifth round. Tate clinched so often and refused to break away that Referee Barton stopped the contest and awarded the decision to Langford.

Getting Ready To Enter Canadian Team In Olympics.
(Montreal Star.)
Word was received by General Manager Melville of the Montreal Amateur Athletic Association, to the effect that James G. Merrick, erstwhile president of the Montreal Amateur Athletic Union of Canada and permanent Olympic commissioner for Canada, will be in this city tomorrow on his way to Ottawa to call upon the minister of finance.

The intention is to get an idea on how much the Canadian government is willing to spend to be well represented at the Olympic games to be held in Belgium next year, and an effort will be made by Mr. Merrick to get a very liberal appropriation for that purpose.

He expresses the hope that either Mr. Melville or some other prominent officer of the Quebec section of the A. A. U. of C. will accompany him upon his mission from this city.

COMMENCEMENT AT ST. JOSEPH'S COLLEGE.
At the fifty-fifth annual commencement of the University of St. Joseph's College in Memramook yesterday degrees and prizes were awarded. His Lordship Bishop LeBlanc was among those present and gave an address, read the opening prayer and gave the benediction. Other speakers included H. A. Powell, K. C., R. W. Hewson, K. C., Moncton; Hon. Dr. Landry and Rev. L. Guertin, C. S. C., Ph. D. Among the prize winners were Emile Dolan and W. O. McDonald of St. John, the eloquent winner of the premium of \$5 in gold, while the former was awarded the Academic course prize of \$10 in gold, the Latin premium of \$5 in gold, and the English premium of \$5 in gold, and divided honors with G. C. Leeger of Memramook in the Mathematics, M. T. Johnson of Newburg, N. B., was the English and Henri P. Linet of Magdalen Islands, the French valedictorian.
