NEWS OF MONCTON

I. C. R. Brakeman Harry Archibald Very Badly Hurt

MARKET TOLLS SOLD

They Bring \$1,650—Go Preacher's
Make Statement to Chief Rider
Out—Bogus Check Passed on
Merchant

Moncton, Dec. 20—Harry Archibald, the
well known I. C. R. brakeman, met with
an accident in the yard here this evening
which, it is feared, will prove fatal. He
was struck by a shunter and very badly
injured about his face and shoulder. He
was removed to the hospital for medical
attendance and it was found one shoulder
was crushed off and his face smashed in. The
doctors have little hope that the unfortunate
man will survive his terrible in-
juries more than a few hours.

It appears that Archibald had gone to
Truro on duty and was returning on the
Maritime express as a passenger. While
the train was passing through the yard
and just before it reached the depot Archibald
jumped off and in some unaccount-
able way was struck by the shunter which
was backing out of the yard to put the
train on the Canadian Bank of Com-
merce. The shunter was in the yard and
he was knocked down and his clothing
being caught, was dragged, until the en-
gine stopped. He was conscious when
picked up but was unable to tell just
how the accident occurred.

Archibald is about thirty-five years of
age and belongs to Mulgrave (N. S.). He
has a wife and three or four children liv-
ing here.

Moncton, N. B., Dec. 20—The city coun-
cil is making a new departure this year in
handling the tolls in the city market. In-
stead of employing a market clerk and
collecting the tolls, tenders have been ask-
ed for the tolls and the services of Market
Clerk Wilson Ltd. will be dispensed with.
McFarlane, \$1,650. The tender of Murray
was accepted. The change means that the
city reverts to the custom of twenty
years ago.

William Sturgeon and William Ford, "Go
Preachers," so called, visited Chief Rider
this evening in connection with letters re-
ceived by the chief from Publio (N. S.)
parties, asking for information about this
sect. They explained their creed, and the
chief said that he might enlighten the Pub-
lio parties. They say they have no creed
and no name, but are living according to
their understanding of the New Testa-
ment's teaching. They left their churches,
preachers being paid big salaries and living
in fine houses. In other words, they are
not absolutely free religion. They have
no church but meet around at the houses
of the faithful. They have a considerable
following in Moncton parish at the Gorge
and at Georgetown. The chief was favor-
ably impressed with their explanation.

A smooth-talking gentleman passed a
bogus check on a local merchant a few days
ago and as yet there is no clue as to his
name. He gave his name as William Howard.
He went into a local general store and pur-
chased a few articles which amounted to \$2.
The excuse he had no change, he pre-
sented a check for \$12.55, alleged to be
drawn by J. H. Stevens, proprietor of the
Stanley House, Truro, dated Dec. 17 and
drawn on the Canadian Bank of Com-
merce, Truro. The proprietor of the store,
wishing to oblige the young man, cashed
the check for \$12.55, in exchange \$10.85.
The check has been returned by the bank
at Truro as worthless.

It is estimated that the amount of \$500 has been imposed on local
Scott act violators. Adelman Arsenau and
others were each fined \$50 today
for C. T. A. violation.

tion to Our Alphabet.

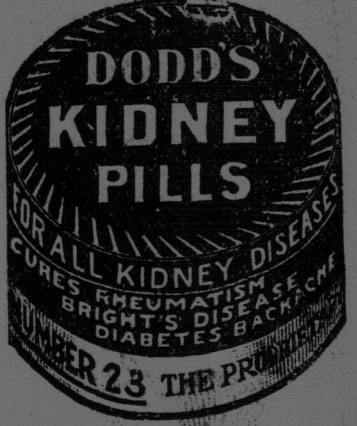
Illustrated by pictures and written exam-

TORIES AS REFORMERS

(Toronto Globe)

Scandal after scandal is being brought
home to the Borden government. Dead-
head appointments to office, men dismissed on
the evidence of released jail-birds, and
money deliberately squandered in the at-
tempt to win elections—these are some
of the revelations. Last week we detailed
most of the facts relative to appoint-
ments, and this week we detail the
House of Commons it was brought out
that the Borden government had bought
land from J. A. Gilles, a defeated Con-
servative candidate at a price of \$1,000 per
acre, and Mr. Gilles just before the pur-
chase swore at a court of revision that
this very land was not worth \$100 per
acre. Point Brand Wharf at Sorel was
bought by the Borden government for \$10,
000 on the eve of the Richelieu election,
yet it had last year been offered for
sale to win elections—these are some
of the revelations.

CLOSING PLEAS IN DYNAMITE CASE NEXT THURSDAY

**Counsel for Defendants Claims That
Their Raising a Defense Fund for
McNamaras Did Indicate Guilty
Knowledge.**

Indianapolis, Dec. 20.—The fact that the
labor union officials now on trial helped
to raise a defense fund for the McNam-
aras, it was argued before the jury at the
"dynamite conspiracy" trial today, did not
indicate guilty knowledge on the part of
forty defendants.

"The very enormity of the crime at Los
Angeles, the very boldness and extent to
which explosions had been carried on for
years made it unthinkable that the sec-
retary of the Iron Workers International
union committed them or caused them to
be committed," said M. C. Tiffin in his
argument for the defense.

United States Senator John W. Kern
will argue for the defense next Monday.
He will be followed by the closing state-
ments of the government. The argument
is to be concluded next Thursday.

THE TWO NAVAL POLICIES

(Toronto Globe)

plain recital from the record of Parlia-
ment proves conclusively which of the
parties has played politics with the navy
issue. Since 1890 the Liberal party has
steadily for the creation of an effective
Canadian naval force. It is prepared to
day to spend thirty-five million dollars on
the construction of two fleet units con-
sisting of two Dreadnought cruisers, six
protected cruisers, twelve destroyers, six
submarines, and to man and maintain
this fleet. The Conservatives, who in 1890
wanted to begin work "speedily" on a Cana-
dian navy, insisted in 1910 that the peo-
ple should be consulted before anything
was done. In 1911 they promised the peo-
ple that they would be consulted, and
this Mr. Montagu Denny, without any
reservation as to an emergency contribu-
tion, in 1912 the Borden government pro-
posed a contribution and Mr. Borden him-
self tramped upon the idea of a Canadian
navy by declaring that "in my humble
opinion nothing of an efficient nature
could be built in this country within a
quarter of a century or perhaps half a
century."

Canadian parliamentary history shows no
such record of lacking and filling, of head-
ing north and sailing south, as this record
of the Conservative leaders on the naval
issue. When the elections have spread
before them from the official records their
verdict should be, and no doubt will be,
that they were a party of evasion and
of unqualified condemnation of the
men who, in the sacred name of patri-
otism, have played fast and loose with a
great imperial and national question.
