French Champion Bested. De Fontaine was the favorite in the betting, a large sum having been placed that he would stop Yelle. The French boy had also been matched to appear before the local club against Matty Baldwin of Boston on next Monday night, but after his defeat last night Yelle will be the Boston man's opponent. In England. LABOR MEN MAKE REQUESTS TO PROVINCIAL GOVERNMENT. Fredericton, N. E., March 19—A delegation from the Trades and Labor Council of St. John waited upon the government this afternoon and asked for legislation in regard to a fair wage clause in all provincial government contracts; protection for the payment of wages; also for an agreement on part of those who seek exemption from taxation that they shall pay their workmen fair wages and improve their working conditions; also that all government printing must have the union label; an eight-hour shift where work is carried on the whole twenty-four hours was also asked for. The repeal of laws providing for the eviction of tenants, and for distraining upon the goods and chattels for arrears in rent, which are used largely against striking workmen, where such workmen are tenants in houses owned by employing corporations. Other requests were to give municipalities the right to tax land values only; to create a labor bureau; abolition of all labor colleges; prohibition of the employment of white females in Oriental restaurants or places of business and the barring of Orientals from any employment on any licensed premises. For the plumbers, M. J. Burns and J. J. Hughes asked legislation to compel plumbers to pass a five years' apprenticeship and to pass an examination; also that master plumbers pass examination before entering business, and also pay an annual fee. The government promised the usual consideration. W. F. Burditt last evening, in the Natural History Society course, delivered an interesting address on "The Stellar Universe."
