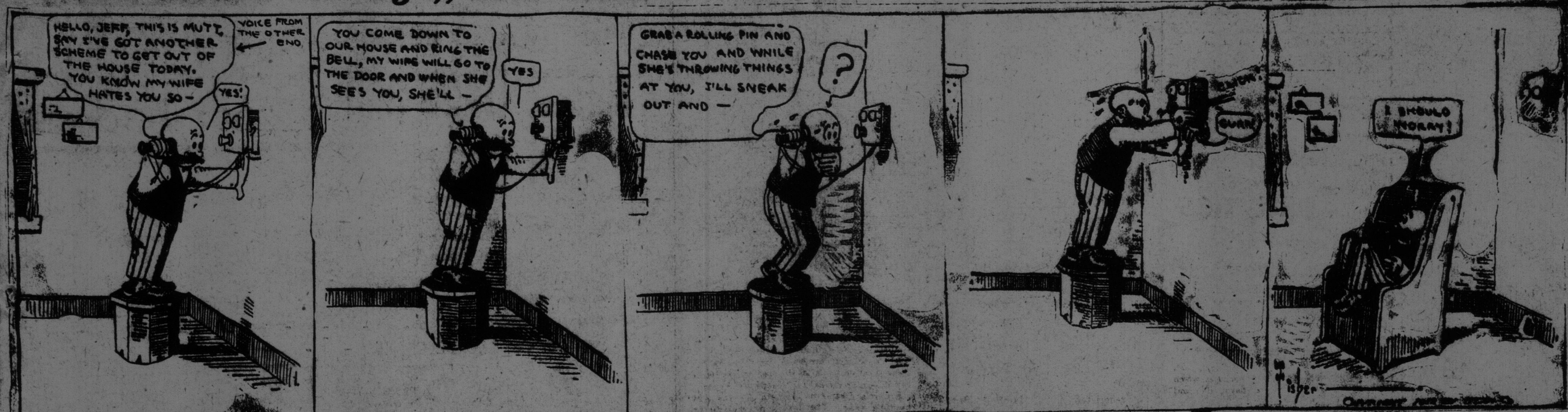

New Bedford, March 18.—Fred Yelle of

Taunton, best boxer in the Province, has

asked as the featherweight champion of

France, in a Round bout at the New

Bedford Athletic Association last night.

Nearly all of the sounds were in the

Taunton lad's favor. His left jab stopped

the French boy every time he attempted

to lead, and the return stomach

punishment he seemed to take as a matter

of course.

De Pontieux with Frank Erne, his manager,

in his corner, fought every minute

a winning punch. De Pontieux was the

favorite in the betting, a large sum having

been placed that he would stop Yelle.

Yelle will be the Boston man's opponent.

Jem Sullivan has been telling his friends

that he did not do himself justice against

Carpenter and that he wants another

chance against the young Frenchman.

Good judges who saw the Monte Carlo

match think there was no fault about the

results, and say Carpenter had his man

virtually beaten from the start. The winner

is very clever, hits hard with either

hand, and, unlike most Frenchmen, is very

cool in action. He will go far and his

friends predict he will yet win the heavy-

weight championship, as he is still growing.

England has a good middleweight in Jack

Harrison, of Rushton, who is a boxer of

the rugged order, and can take and give

real hard knocks. With a bit more polish

he may trouble the best in his class, and

the writer expects to see him beat Sullivan,

but Carpenter is another matter.

The news that Bomb Billy Wells is going

to America in May, and will meet Al

Palmer in California on July 4, has not

created much stir here. It is really surprising

that the English champion shies such poor

judgment in making the arrangement. No

Englishman can hope to be at his best in

America between May and August, the best

being too much of a change. The time to arrive is in

September, fixing the important matches for

the end of October or early November.

Wells made a wretched showing against

Storbeck, and even allowing for the fact

that he was stale and overtrained, the

writer does not expect him to get through

many contests in America without meeting

with a reverse.

## TWO SESSIONS OF THE GRAND ORANGE LODGE

Gain of More Than 800—Grand Master in Opposition to Heme Rule and Ne Temere Decree

The Grand Orange Lodge of New Brun-

swick held two sessions yesterday.

The meeting was opened yesterday after-

noon at 2:30 with the reading of the re-

port of the grand secretary, Neil J. Mon-

rison. This report reviewed the work of

the order for the year and was most en-

couraging and optimistic. It showed a

gain of more than 800 in membership dur-

ing the year. One hundred and fifty

delegates were reported in good working

order.

The report also suggested the appoint-

ment of an organizer to cover both New

Brunswick and Nova Scotia.

The report of the grand master reviewed

the history of the order, making men-

tion of its objects. It was a lengthy docu-

ment and among some of the more im-

portant matters dealt with was Irish home

rule and the Ne Temere decree. Strong

opposition was expressed to the proposi-

tion to give Ireland home rule and the grand

master was outspoken on the Ne Temere

decree. He counselled Orangemen to con-

tinue the measure and suggested a set of

resolutions against it.

The evening session was taken up by

address by the County Master, W. M. Camp-

bell, and the District Master, J. G. Sullivan, and the appointment of com-

mittees.

In his address the county master after

welcoming the brethren, referred to the

organization of the Provincial Grand

Lodge in 1844, and to the history of St.

John from the coming of the Loyalists.

He traced the growth of this city from

that early period to the present time,

telling of the forward movement at this

port and predicting a great future with

the building of the Courtenay Bay terminal

facilities.

The address of the district master also
