

The CHAIRMAN announced that we would sing the "National Anthem," as a suitable closing to a grand and successful meeting. This was followed by "Praise God from Whom all blessings flow." MR. ROGERS then pronounced the Benediction, which concluded the meeting at 9.30 p. m., strictly within the limits.

ON the same evening Charles Street Church was well filled; REV. MR. BORDEN in the chair. The opening hymn was "All hail the power of Jesus' name." After hymn, prayers by REV. E. SOFTLEY, and a few earnest remarks by the CHAIRMAN, the REV. N. I. PERRY spoke on "The value of the Bible to the individual and society." It told of man's destiny, of power to overcome sin, and told of peace. Despite the declarations that the Bible was an exploded book, it still went on its way with renewed vigor. Voltaire said that within one hundred years the Bible would be a subject of ancient history. Voltaire is that subject now; and now the house Voltaire lived in is stacked with Bibles, and his printing press used to print the Bible. The real reason many refused to accept fully the Bible teachings is that, like Robert Ingersoll, they do not want to believe anything that will make them uncomfortable.

CAPT. WINN said that his subject had been the "Bible Society is Auxiliary to Foreign Missions." He showed clearly that it was the backbone of foreign missions, for without it they cannot get along. It had translated the Bible into 325 languages. Unless the Word of God was left in the hands of their converts, their foreign missions were doomed to failure. The work of translation was a huge undertaking, for they sought to let every soul have a Bible in their own tongue, and used the utmost care to secure accurate copies of the Word of God.
